## Sister Mary Says:

By Sister Mary  
Breakfast—Baked pears, cereal, thin cream, codfish puddings, tomato sauce, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of celery soup, toasted crackers, spinach and egg salad, rice and apple pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Broiled lamb chops, creamed potatoes, green peas, bean soup, head lettuce with Roquefort cheese dressing, sliced peaches on sponge cake with whipped cream, rice bread, milk, coffee.

Don't forget that even the best of families will rebel at the same cereal served morning after morning. Serve the ready-to-serve cereals occasionally, particularly when the rest of the breakfast is hearty and of the sort that the whole family can eat.

### Rice and Apple Pudding

Five tart apples, 3 tablespoons rice, 2 cups milk, 3 eggs, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 2-3 teaspoon lemon extract, 1/2 cup seeded raisins, currant jelly, 4 tablespoons powdered sugar.

Cook rice in slightly salted boiling water for 26 minutes. Let water cook away. Beat two whole eggs and one yolk until light with sugar. Beat in milk, vanilla and lemon extract and add to rice. Stir until well mixed and add raisins. Pare apples and remove core from stem end, taking care not to cut through the blossom ends of the apple. Arrange apples in a buttered baking dish and pour rice custard around but not covering the apples. Bake in a moderate oven until apples are tender and rice is firm to the touch. Remove from oven and fill cavities with currant jelly. Cover with the white of egg beaten until stiff and dry with the powdered sugar folded in after beating. Place in a slow oven for eight minutes to puff and brown the meringue. Serve warm or cold with or without whipped cream. (Copyright, 1925, NEA Service)

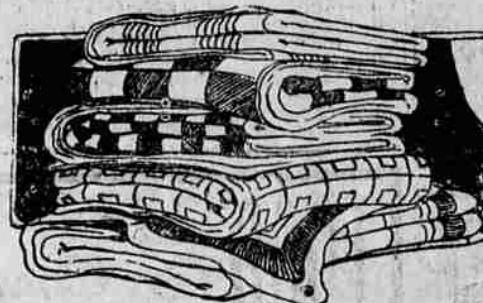
