SAN FRANCISCO (By the Associated Press)—The San Francisco Seals became 1925 champions of the Pacific coast league yesterday when they defeated the Vernon Tigers 2 to 1 in a closely contested battle. At the same time Salt Lake, second place contender, lost to Seattle, last year's champions, making the Seals' victory doubly certain.

This is the third pennant for the Seals in the last four years. The Seals now lead the league by 14 1/2 games.

Chinese Pheasant Season Opens Soon

The open season on Chinese pheasants in Union, Umatilla, Baker, Grant, Malheur, Morrow, Klamath, Hood River, Wasco and Wallowa counties will begin on October 15, according to the Oregon hunting laws.

The season will end October 31. Local sportsmen expect some keen sport this year with pheasants reported plentiful.

HARRELD FORCES ISSUE

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Harreld, republican, Oklahoma, has publicly thrown down the gauntlet to Assistant Secretary Andrews of the treasury on the question whether senators are to be consulted in the appointment or dismissal of prohibition enforcement officers.

In a letter to the prohibition field marshal, the senator advised notice that it would be impossible to keep peace in the republican party in Oklahoma unless he and Senator Maas, also a republican, were consulted about appointments and removals.

"I feel it but fair to say to you in advance that we shall acknowledge this courtesy from your department," he declared.

BOISE BRAVES DEFEAT PARMA

BOISE, Ida. (Special)—Loren H. Basler's red-shirted Braves invaded Parma Friday and emerged victorious by a narrow margin. The score at the end of the game stood, Boise 4, Parma 0, but spectators were in doubt of the outcome until the last whistle.

The game was fast and hard fought throughout. Boje winning on two safeties in the second quarter, one on a long punt from the dangerous toe of Bob Davidson and the other on a bad pass by Parma's snapperback. Both teams fought for a touchdown in the third but they were both better on defense than offense, so the halt changed hands often.

Boje started a march down the field in the fourth quarter and carried the ball to the Parma 20-yard line, where Miller fumbled. Boje recovered but lost the ball on downs a moment later and the Parma aggregation started a savage passing attack, which carried them to Boise's 20-yard line.

Braves Check Attack.
 The Braves then attacked and held for down. Boje got the ball and the whistle blew for the end of the game.

Basler's expected passing attack failed to materialize, but a few times being attempted by Boje. Parma, too, played the safe and sane game of backs and end runs until the last period, when they unrolled a desperate aerial bombardment in an effort to down the Braves.

This game, although given little significance, was one of the most important on the Boise schedule as Parma has a team of unusual strength this year and was expected to show up well in the race for district championship.

Good teamwork was reported much in evidence among Basler's proteges.
