COURT IS READY FOR MORE OIL PROMOTERS

TENARKANA, Ark. (By the Associated Press)—More oil company promoters are expected to go on trial before Judge Youmans in United States District court here when it convenes October 12 for a special term.

The Texarkana court for the last two years has been the scene of trials of other promoters who are alleged to have taken in millions through extravagant promises and representations on which to sell oil stock. A dozen or more have been sent to the federal prison at Leavenworth.

The docket for the October term has on it the cases of John Messenger, W. Homer Taylor, Jess L. Tomberlin, Louis S. Grimm, W. E. Simmons, Harvey B. Pratt, Paul L. Planey, Jim Dreyer, Jay J. Grimes and Joe Murphy. All are charged in from five to nine counts with use of the mails to defraud.

Witnesses in the cases will come from all parts of the country.

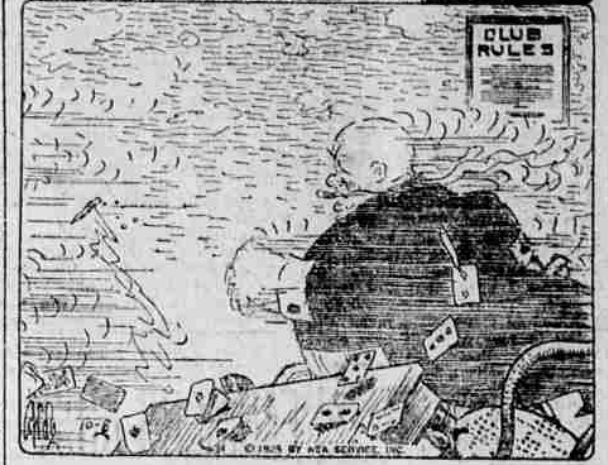
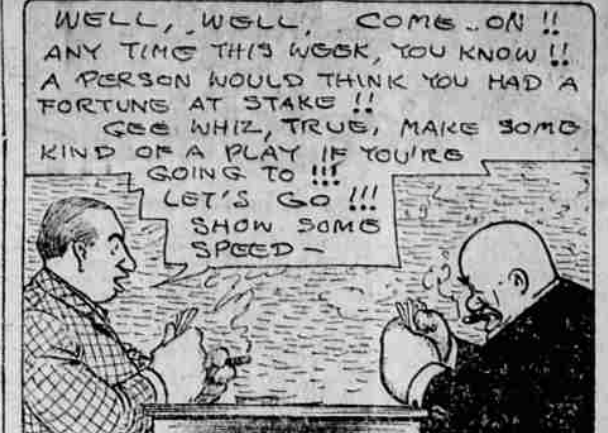

"Night Life of New York" produced for Paramount by Allan Dwan, who made "Robin Hood," "Manhattan" etc., is the feature today and Tuesday at the Arcade theater. Rod La Roque, Dorothy Gish, Ernest Terrence and George Hackathorne are featured in the leading roles of the picture, which is an original screen story by Edgar Selwyn, the playwright-producer.

There's a scene at one of New York's famous supper clubs, followed by a jewel robbery which implicates Ronald, though Meg's brother Jimmy and a pal are the real crooks. Bentley Sr. gets new

that his son's in jail and has a fine laugh all to himself, thinking all this part of his scheme. Word from Meg, however, brings him to the city on the jump, and there are some unusually convincing and laughable scenes before the affair is straightened out.

The picture closes with Ronald, now all fed up with Broadway, and Meg leaving for Clay City. But father remains to "see the sights" under the guidance of the actress.

If there ever was a picture with a hand-picked cast, this is it. La Roque, Miss Gish, Terrence and Hackathorne never did anything better in their lives. And Helen Lee, Worthing, Arthur Housman and Riley Hatch give capable support.

The picture includes shots of New York City never before seen on the screen—and they're the real thing, having been filmed "on the spot."
