## SERIES NEAR MILLION MARK

According to the Associated Press the total attendance for the first world series game played today is 113,521. Total receipts are \$13,664.

If today's game is won by the Pirates, undoubtedly the series will be another of those million-dollar affairs. Even should the Senators win today, there would be an outside chance of topping seven figures.

Receipts yesterday were \$145,075, which, when compared with money taken in some two years ago, more than 100 years ago, when the world series were just beginning to take definite form, is an enormous sum. More is taken in one day now than at an entire series a decade ago.

Other interesting figures given by the Associated Press follow: Advisory committee's share of total receipts—\$121,746.66; players' share—\$22,817.34.

The paid attendance for the first five games of last year's series was 217,774 and total receipts \$240,218. Although the figures are slightly less this year, weather conditions are held by many to be partly responsible.

Every Pirate yesterday seemed at least one safe hit with the exception of Aldridge, pitcher, who was too busy turning back would-be hitters to worry about his own batting.

Incidentally, Corvidio, Patton, Zachary and Martney failed to hit safely for the Senators.

Joe Harris' home run was worthy of considerable comment. If he keeps up the present pace he may break a record or so for world series play.

Isabel, of the Senators, is one of these pinch hitters who actually delivers. Her batting average today, he contributed a two-runger and was one of the three Senators who crossed home plate.

Blunge, back in the line-up yesterday after a layoff because of the injury he had for two games. Blunge would seem to indicate that he has recovered.

Aldridge's victory yesterday gives him even with Walter Johnson for this year's series—two wins each.
