Sister Mary Says:

By Sister Mary. Breakfast—Orange juice, cereal, thin cream, creamed dried beef on toast, crisp griddle toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of celery soup, croissants, date bread, head lettuce salad, cup custard, milk, tea.

Dinner—Baked hamburger steak with stuffed green peppers, cabbage and celery salad, grape sponge cake, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

A border of mashed potatoes surrounds the steak and a stuffed pepper for each person to be served is placed just inside the potato border. If onions are used in the pepper stuffing do not season the steak with onion.

This date bread will be a valuable addition to a lunch box and will be equally acceptable on an afternoon tea table.

Date Bread

Two cups light brown sugar, 2 cups bread flour, 1 cup rye flour, 2 teaspoons soda, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons melted lard, 1 1/2 cups boiling water, 1 tablespoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 cup chopped nut meats, 2 cups dates, 1 egg.

Beat hard for half a minute and pour into a deep brick-shaped pan, well oiled and floured and bake in a moderately slow oven for one hour.
