CITY POPULATION ESTIMATES MADE BY U. S. BUREAU

WASHINGTON (AP)—Census bureau calculations of city populations as of July 1 this year, covering a large part of the United States, were made public Sunday by the department of commerce.

New York being omitted, Chicago, with a total of 2,995,239, was the largest city listed. For Philadelphia the bureau estimated 1,979,384; for Detroit, 1,242,044; for Cleveland, 926,485; for St. Louis, 821,543; for Baltimore, 796,249; Boston, 781,529; Pittsburgh, 437,564; San Francisco, 557,520; Buffalo, 538,061; and Milwaukee, 509,182.

These were the only cities listed which were assigned more than a half million of population. The bureau calculations were based on the rate of increase shown during the decade 1910-1920, except in a few cases where recent state or local census figures were available. Calculations were not made for Los Angeles, Atlanta, Akron, Oklahoma City, Norfolk and a few other points where there was reason to believe the results would be far from correct.

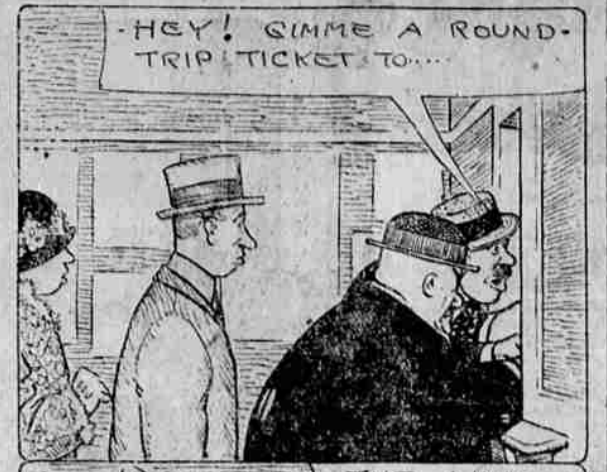
Cities shown to have population between 300,000 and half a million include Washington, D. C., 487,998; Newark, 452,513; Minneapolis, 425,435; New Orleans, 414,495; Cincinnati, 409,333; Kansas City, 367,431; Indianapolis, 358,819; Rochester, 310,786; and Jersey City, 312,280.

Above 200,000 the bureau also placed Toledo, 257,380; Portland, Ore., 232,333; Denver, 230,911; Columbus, 219,836; Providence, R. I., 267,918; Louisville, 259,259; Oakland, 258,709; St. Paul, 246,001; Omaha, 211,768; and Birmingham, 205,670.

Estimates were not made for cities having less than 10,000 population nor for communities in Florida, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, New York, Rhode Island, South Dakota and Wyoming, where state censuses have been recently taken.

Birds Perpetuate Oak Tree.
LONDON (AP)—Professional foresters in England are not planting many oak trees, but the birds are carrying acorns and in winter lands the oak is being perpetuated by nature, despite the decline in the demand for oak in commerce. Concrete has displaced oak for fence posts and in many parts of England sycamores and other soft woods are more popular with builders.

Arab Says "Needle's Eye" of Bible Refers to Wall Gate

PITTSBURGH, Kan. (AP)—The "needle's eye" referred to in the New Testament is a small gate in the Wall of Jerusalem, not a sewing needle, at least in the opinion of John Noguira, 23 year old Arab guide in the Holy Land, who is studying music at the Pittsburgh State Teachers' college.

"The Biblical passage to which this modern job has attracted a new meaning is in Mark 10:25, wherein Jesus chided those who 'strut in riches,' saying: 'It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle, than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven.'"

"The needle's eye," says Noguira, "commonly understood as the eye of a sewing needle, is known to Jerusalem as a small gate within a larger gate in the city walls. It is for the use of pedestrians after the larger gate is closed for the night for protection. The gate is so low that an average-sized man must stoop low to go through it."

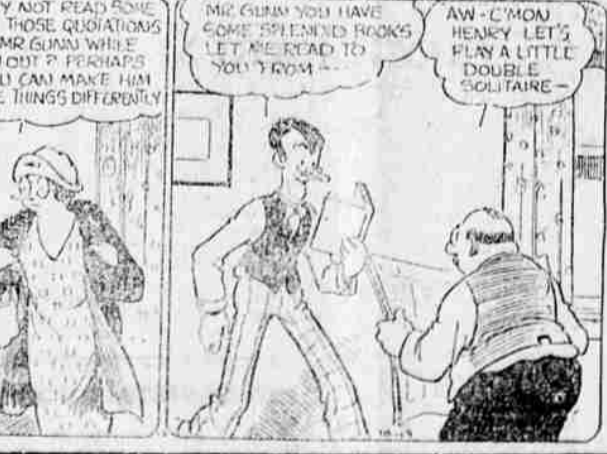
