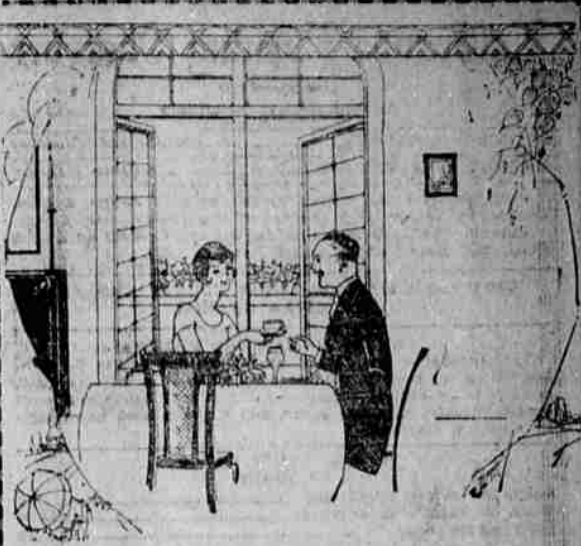
Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Halves of grapefruit, broiled bacon, scrambled eggs with rice, Graham muffins, milk, coffee.
Lunch—Cauliflower au gratin, toasted muffins, apple sauce, kindergarten, milk, tea.
Dinner—Baked halibut with tomato sauce, twice baked potatoes, buttered brussels sprouts, entire salad, grapes, rolled oats bread, milk, coffee.

Brussels sprouts are an excellent vegetable for young children. They belong to the cabbage family but are more delicate than cabbage itself. Cook uncovered and there will be no objectionable odor through the house.

Cauliflower au Gratin
One head cauliflower, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 cup coarse bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons melted butter.
Remove outer green leaves from

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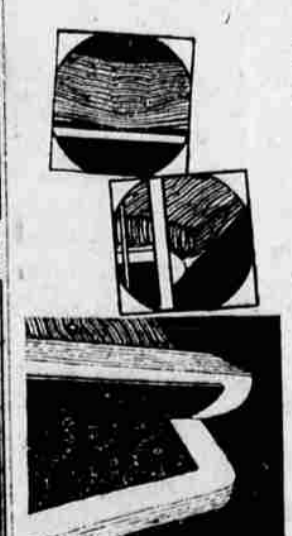
