Preliminary to the opening of bids, an attack was launched on the present method of handling the bond question in La Grande. Commissioner H. P. Landis suggested that a new ordinance to govern the matter be drawn up or else the old ordinance be provided with a few "teeth." The matter was referred to the city attorney.

A license was granted Nell Cambry to operate a rooming house at 213 1/2 and 215 1/2 Fir street. A property owner was present and referred to a request entered in March for a sidewalk between Greenwood and Fir on N. Commissioner Landis moved that the city manager be ordered to install

the sidewalk. The motion carried unanimously.

Hearing Held.
A hearing was held on improvement district 3-8, providing for a sanitary sewer in blocks 5 and 12. Wisdom's addition. No objections or remonstrances were received and the recorder was authorized to advertise for bids at the pleasure of the commission. Announcement was made that the project will be laid on the table until spring, because of adverse weather conditions.

A communication from the E. O. L. & P. company in reference to establishing valuation on property here was read and filed. City Manager W. C. Crews reported that the pumper fire truck arrived yesterday. The monthly bills and estimates were read and approved before adjournment.
