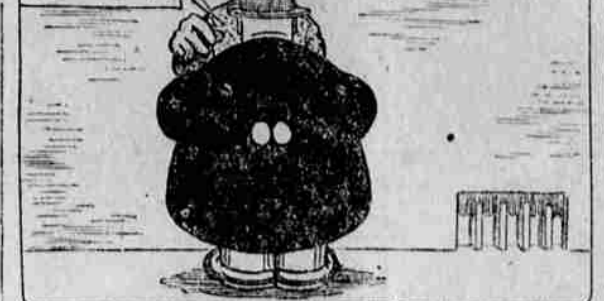

"Proud Flesh" at Sherrys Is Democratic Tale

King Vidor's latest contribution to motion pictures comes to the Sherry theater today and tomorrow in the production "Proud Flesh," a Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer offering. It is said to maintain the high calibre of work done in the past by this director, one of the youngest in the motion picture industry.

Eleanor Boardman, as Fernanda, plays a role that is antithetical of those in which she has recently appeared. Fernanda is proud and arrogant; reared in atmosphere of aristocratic continental culture, Miss Boardman has heretofore been identified with the roles of sweet, lovable American girls as in "Wife of the Centaur," "Sinners in Silk" and "So This is Marriage."

Pat O'Malley depicts a fighting, young Irish-American plumber; the democratic American in a pair of overalls. The name of the character, curiously enough, is Patrick O'Malley.

In an opposite role, depicting culture, nobility and refinement, is Harrison Ford, who plays Don Jaime. The character is a carefree, likeable young chap, with a keen sense of humor.

Conan Doyle's "Lost World" at Arcade Tonight

Probably the most unusual love drama ever put on the screen is "The Lost World," which opens at the Arcade theater today for a three days' run.

The picture is an adaptation of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's novel of the same title. 1912's adventure and scientific romances had never had the slightest conception of its film possibilities. He pointed a vivid word picture of a lost world in the vast, unexplored regions of the upper Amazon river which Time had forgot.

There Doyle's band of adventurers found prehistoric monsters that roamed the earth 10,000,000 years ago and killed each other to the death in the days of old.

Into the heart of this monster-infested district went this party of explorers—three men and a girl. Their mission was to rescue her father, if he still lived, and prove to the world the existence of the prehistoric beasts—the brontosaurus, bigger than ten elephants; the tyrannosaurus, most ferocious creature that ever stalked this earth; the stegosaurus, triceratops, the pterodactyl, or great flying dragon, and other gigantic species.

As the modern humans watched, awe-inspired, these monsters gave deadly battle to one another—such battles as never before have been witnessed on a motion picture screen.

Numerous motion picture producers have tried in vain to film Doyle's story, but the re-creation of the monsters was deemed impossible.

Finally, however, an embryo sculptor named Willis H. O'Brien "discovered" the monsters. He submitted his strange idea to Waterson H. Rothacker, owner of film laboratories in Chicago and Los Angeles. Rothacker saw its possibilities, and, joining hands with First National Pictures, launched work on the project.

That was seven years ago. Since then work has proceeded steadily, and now the picture is complete. It establishes probably the record for time production in the film industry as well as a record for uniqueness.

"Lorraine of the Lions" Features She-Tarzan

Posed on the parapet of a country mansion, Lorraine Livingston was about to be dashed to the ground by a huge gorilla that had her in his grasp. Summoning her strange power over animals, she forced the beast to drop her on the ledge, the animal falling to its death a moment after.

As a feminine version of Tarzan the story in which this incident appears, will be shown at the Star theater, commencing Friday. It is called "Lorraine of the Lions," a Universal-Jewel production, with Norman Kerry as star and Patsy Ruth Miller opposite him.

The girl is shipwrecked on a deserted island at the age of seven. Here she grows up with wild beasts as her only companions, until she is rescued twelve years later. The girl's experiences on the South Sea island with her galaxy of pets, including twenty lions, two tigers, a gorilla and thirty monkeys, make an interesting narrative.

But when she takes the gorilla back to civilization with her she runs into a series of exciting adventures which surpass even her thrilling jungle life. The animal shows a strange tinge of jealousy and refuses to allow the girl to have human companions.

Norman Kerry plays the part of the girl's lover, while Patsy Ruth Miller takes the title role. The story, which was written by Isadore Bernstein, was directed by Edward Sedgwick. Others in the cast are Fred Humes, Joseph J. Dowling, Philo McCullough, Harry Todd, Frank Newburg, Rosemary Conroy, Gordon Turpin, Jackie Goodrich and W. Stewart McCrea.
