Washington reaches farther from home than usual this season, meeting the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, October 17. The Huskies play Leland Stanford here November 7.

MANY STRONG ELEVEN. If early season showings count for anything, there seems certain to be many strong teams on the gridiron this fall. More so, perhaps, than in quite a few campaigns.

For instance, in the east, Yale, Princeton, Dartmouth, Columbia, Cornell and others started off nicely. Yale handed Middlebury a neat 53-9 trouncing; Princeton crushed Amherst; Columbia swamped Johns Hopkins and Cornell blanked Niagara.

True, the defeated teams were really nothing more than setups. But when you score 52 points on an opponent you must have something in the way of an attack.

Columbia's victory was its second in as many titles. In both of them the Crowley machine looked impressive. And it wouldn't be at all surprising to see Columbia get somewhere this season.

Harvard, though beating little Kenosha, didn't accomplish anything wonderful, but the Crimson usually starts slowly anyway.

IN BIG TEN. If their work in the opening games can be taken as a criterion, the Big Ten should produce several strong teams this campaign. Michigan, Wisconsin and Iowa all showed to advantage in the battles.

This was especially true of Wisconsin, where Coach George Little appears to have molded together a formidable machine. In Poland, the Badgers have one of the best flankers in Western conference circles, while the Harmon brothers are good backfield men.

PITTSBURGH, Pa. (AP)—Baseball fans paid \$1,182,854 to see seven games in the world series, creating a record for total receipts. In the 1924 event \$1,093,104 was taken at the gate.

The Pirates and Senators played to 18,600 fewer persons than did the Yankees and Giants in the great baseball party of New York two years ago, when the record attendance of 341,429 was set, but drew \$119,629 more.

WARNER'S FIRST BIG TEST WITH SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA.

SANTA ANITA (AP)—Jim Warner, football coach at Stanford University, has eight veterans missing from the team that last season led California to the Pacific Coast Conference championship. Yet the 1925 eleven promises to be superior.

Last fall Stanford won every game of the regular season except the big game with California, which resulted in a 29-to-20 tie. Stanford lost a post-season game to Notre Dame at Pasadena. The three regulars from 1924 are Captain Ernie Nevers, 295-pound full-back, widely mentioned in All-America selections; Ted Shipkey, end, and Fred Swan, guard. Several others back on the squad made varsity letters last season, but did not play regularly.
