OREGON CITY WILL VOTE

OREGON CITY, Ore.—By a vote of two to one the city commission decided to call a special municipal election for November 10 to vote on the proposed charter amendment. An initiative petition was recently filed with the commission signed by more than 300 voters requesting the election, which aims to do away with the present city commission form of government instituted here in January, 1924, and return to a council-mayor type, with four councilmen, one from each ward in the city and a mayor elected at large.

The plan is to place certain departments of city government under each councilman and thus abolish the present city manager, who is working under a salary and has direct supervision over the departments.

District to Elect Trustees

BAKER, Ore.—Five trustees and a vice-president of the Oregon irrigation congress will be elected here by members from the second congressional district under the provision of the new constitution adopted by that body during the recent convention at Grants Pass. The statutes now provide that each district shall elect five trustees and a vice-president, according to Walter E. Meachum, who has returned after attending the congress.

URGES COAL CONSERVATION PROGRAM; TOO LATE FOR OIL.

ATLANTIC CITY (AP)—That it is already too late to start on a plan of oil conservation was the statement made today by Horace H. Clark, a fuel engineer of Chicago, before the convention of the

American Gas association.

"It is useless to start a national oil conservation program now, because the oil will be gone before the program is completed," he said. "Let us, therefore, start a conservation program on coal, which is the most important national resource we have, and like natural gas and oil, when gone cannot be replenished."

Gas companies, themselves among the largest users of petroleum products, are seeking ways to shake off their dependence on oil, said Horace C. Porter of Philadelphia.
