1925 Days of '49 Classed as Most Orderly Fair of Its Kind

1,224 PERSONS AT SHOW LAST NIGHT

Total Paid Attendance Expected to Better the 4,000 Mark, Elks' Committeemen Say.

RUMOR SAYS TWO VOTED ACQUITTAL

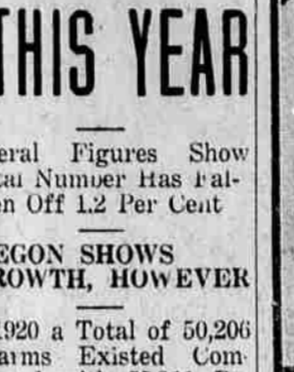
