Seals to Play Louisville.
LOS ANGELES (AP)—The dangerous opposition San Francisco failed to meet in its parade in the Pacific Coast League yesterday this year, but it is not as pleased as it appeared when the Seals met Louisville, champions of the American association, in the final world series game played at San Francisco last Thursday.

Bull was the prediction of Harry Williams, president of the Coast league, in a statement issued immediately after the game. "The Seals were never in a position to win," he said, "we can turn our undivided attention to the forthcoming series between San Francisco and Louisville.

"It is clear, there are no postponed games to be played and I am leaving Tuesday for San Francisco to get busy with President Hines of the American association on formulation of rules for the series."

He predicted it would be a hard fought series. "San Francisco, in my estimation," he said, "has the greatest minor league team ever put on a baseball field, but its showing in the last two weeks indicates it may have gone stale as a result of the long season and the 32 exhibition games it played last season." Louisville, on the other hand, has a wonderful field that last the Orioles largely through the suspension of use of its players.

"San Francisco can overcome the handicap I have mentioned, I am satisfied it can conquer any minor league team in the country decisively."

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Another week-end lap in the Pacific coast football conference race found Stanford setting the pace by rout of 12 to 5 victory over Southern California in a tense game at Los Angeles.

McKennon Makes Touchdown
 In the second half La Grande continued the steady advance and, with the backs working to perfection, took the ball in the field from Enterprise's 25-yard line and scored in eight plays.

Glass failed to convert after McKennon punted the ball over from the two-yard line.

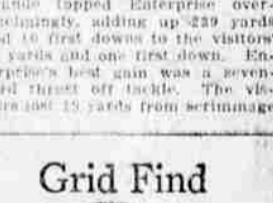
The remainder of the game resembled a procession of punts and penalties for La Grande, necessitating frequent punts. Enterprises was unable to gain against the Tigers' strong defense and returned the punts, gaining from 5 to 15 yards on each exchange. The half was in Enterprises' possession on La Grande's 25-yard line when the final whistle was blown with the score: La Grande 12, Enterprise 0.

Penalties Many

Not a penalty was called against the visitors, but the home team was penalized 55 yards for six offenses.

In last yardage gained La Grande topped Enterprise overwhelmingly, adding up 229 yards and 11 first downs to the visitors' 51 yards and one first down. Enterprises' best gain was a seven-yard thrust off tackle. The visitors lost 15 yards from scrimmage.
