Richard Dana of St. Louis, Mo., suffered lacerations about the face and neck, severe injuries to the back and a fractured jaw. He was taken to the Middletown hospital where it was said his condition was serious.

Frederick A. Spencer of Cleveland, Ohio, received a severe back sprain, Edmund Beaumont of Kingston, Pa., suffered internal injuries.

Albert H. Matheny Jr. of Pittsburg, Pa., was cut about the legs and suffered a broken rib. John R. Johnson of Cleveland, Ohio, was badly cut about the face and arms and suffered a severe scalp wound. Fletcher Collins of Pittsburg, Pa., was cut about the body and received scalp wounds.

ONE STILL MISSING JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) - All but one of the passengers and crew of the Clyde line steamer Comanche, which was destroyed by fire at a half mile off Newport early Saturday night, had been accounted for Sunday, officials of the line announced.

The missing man is William Lawrence of Winthrop, Mass., a passenger. Only three of the injured remained in the hospital here Sunday night, the others having recovered sufficiently to continue their journey. Most of the injuries occurred during the transfer of the passengers from the burning hulk to the tanker, The Reaper, which answered the Comanche's SOS.

TWO KILLED BY TRAIN RED WING, Minn. (AP) - Blinded by wind-driven snow, two youths were killed here Sunday by a Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad passenger train, while walking into town after riding the "blind baggage" here from Winona. The dead are: Robert Schneider, of St. Paul, about 18 years old.

Walter Fish, Davenport, Iowa, 20 years old.

THREE WOMEN ARE GASSED CHICAGO (AP) - A poison gas bomb placed in the vestibule of a north side apartment building Sunday overcame three women and endangered the lives of several other occupants of the building. It was the second such attack and the tenth visit of the intruder to the building in four weeks. The police said the attack apparently was directed at Mrs. Anna Combs, 39, comely wife of a policeman. In one instance the bomb was left after she had been summoned to the door of her apartment late at night.

state council. "Heretofore we have had a single state convention, but we plan to divide the state into three sections—Williamette valley, Southern Oregon and Eastern Oregon—and La Grande would be an ideally located site for the Eastern Oregon meeting," Mrs. Johnson said.

With the Rev. Walter L. Van Nuss, field representative of the Presbyterian Board of Christian Education, and a leader in today's institute, Mrs. Johnson made a trip to Wallowa Lake park Friday to investigate the possibilities of the Methodist Episcopal conference grounds there and is expected to recommend them to the International Council of Religious Education for the establishment of a fourth training school for national leadership. The action may first be taken by the state body and then turned over to the international council, she explained.


Organization of a county branch of the state convention was expected to conclude the afternoon session, which was attended by representatives of churches and Sunday schools in Union county.

Mrs. Clara E. Enson of Portland, who is state representative for the Disciples of Christ church, arrived unexpectedly in La Grande yesterday and her assistance was enlisted for the institute program. She gave one of the closing speeches of the afternoon, her subject being "Relations of the Sunday School to the Home."

The morning session today was given over to general discussions under the leadership of Dr. Van Nuss on the incorporation of greater religious education in the home and plans for putting the program into operation.

Sunday, the three visitors addressed large congregations in a number of the local churches. Mrs. Johnson spoke at the Methodist church, South, the Island City Community church and the Christian church. Dr. Van Nuss delivered sermons at First M. E., Presbyterian and Baptist churches. Mrs. Enson gave the evening address at the Christian church.

Lambouillets will be very strong with good stiff showings from California in the herd of Huard Bros. Moran will be back from up in Washington, and maybe some good stuff from over in Utah. And there will be a good strong showing from various other smaller lots.

Mrs. Miller from Thousand Spring Farms, Idaho, is out of the circuit again this year with her famous Hampshire flock, willing to beat any and all comers.

"It does look as if we were going to have the biggest showing of this popular breed anywhere and it's justified because there is over \$1500 premiums for this breed," said a member of the committee in charge.

The Shropshire breed is organized very strongly in this part of the country and is piling up a wonderful entry list. Something like 43 to 45 breeds of sheep will find a good representation this year.
