Rehabilitation Successful
In Oregon National Forest

RESCUE (Ore. CAP)—Rehabilitation in the Mount Hood Douglas fir area of the Snake national forest in Western Oregon has proved successful. Trees planted from 1912 to 1914 are eight to 18 feet high, the average being 12 feet 10 inches. In addition to the replanting

started in 1917, approximately 150,000 fir were set out two years ago. Four out of five of these trees are growing, except on the highest mountains, where there is little protection from the elements.
