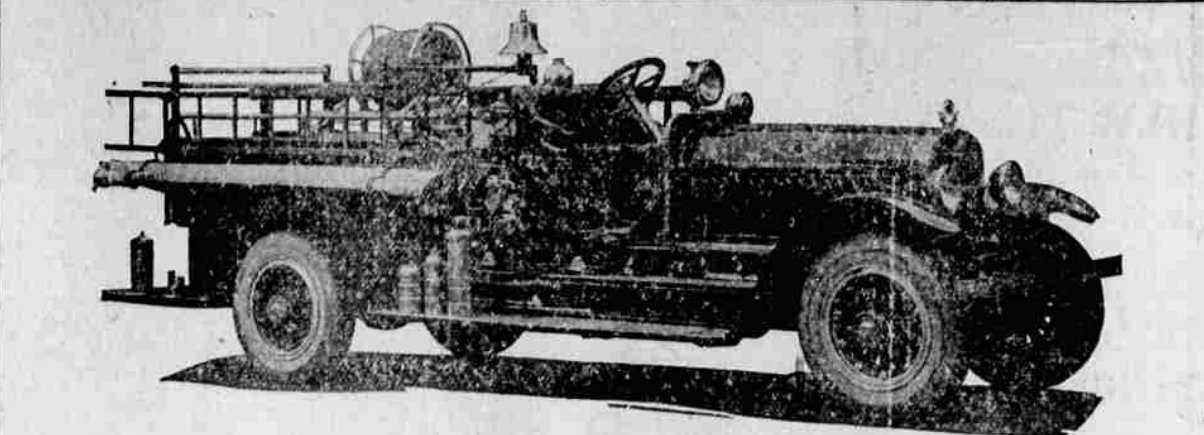

La Grande's New Pumper Truck



Above is pictured the new Stutz pumper truck purchased by the city and officially demonstrated here yesterday at the Bowman-Hicks Lumber company mills. Other cities in the northwest having fire trucks of the same model include: Boise, Yakima, Portland, Medford, Nampa, Aberdeen, Bellingham, Bremerton, Spokane, Roseburg, Astoria and Warrenton. Pendleton has a pumper truck of a smaller type.

PUMPER TRUCK PASSES TESTS
This is the largest type Stutz 225-horsepower engine and the pump has a displacement of two and a half gallons each revolution. According to Roy E. Nelson, of the Howard-Cooper corporation, who presided at the demonstration yesterday, the La Grande truck is the very latest in fire fighting apparatus—same as in use in large cities over all the country. Ralph Crawford, Portland, delivery engineer, will remain here the rest of the week, instructing the local fire department employees in the handling and care of the new apparatus.
Figures given by Mr. Nelson in reference to the demonstration show that during the three hours about 25,000 gallons of water, or 442 tons were thrown.
The demonstration was witnessed by the mayor, two commissioners and the fire chief of Baker, Ore., besides local city officials and citizens.
Incidentally, the new pumper truck was the means of giving La Grande a great deal of publicity. When the truck was completed and shipped from the factory, it was sent to Louisville, Kentucky, where it was on display during the International Fire Chiefs' convention, which was attended by delegates from Germany, Argentina, Brazil, Mexico, Canada, England, and practically every large city in the United States. A similar truck was displayed at the Northwest Fire Chiefs' convention at Seattle some time ago.
Mr. Nelson, in pointing out the benefits to a city from purchasing such equipment, said that Centralia, Wash., voted down a measure to buy one with the result that fire insurance was raised 25 per cent. "Every 15 months the difference is sufficient to pay for a new Stutz truck of the kind La Grande now has," he declared. It is said that fire insurance rates here will be lowered 7 per cent because of the purchase.

Al Smith Not Ready To Seek Presidency
ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—Governor Smith reiterated Monday that he would retire to private life at the end of his present term as chief executive of New York state.
"A man can't go on indefinitely in this job," he said.
"I'm afraid that I have been asked once or twice that any man would be a fool who did not accept the presidential nomination if it was tendered to him, he said: "That is true. But there is a great difference between accepting nomination and going after it. The only chance I would have to get the presidential nomination would be when all the leaders were convinced that I was the only man who could win. Anyone would be foolish to go about the country talking with an eye on the nomination more than two years before the nomination is made."

RAKIB'S FUR IN VOGUE Was a Fossil, New 4. Source of Profit
WILLIAMSON, N. Z. (AP)—Modern man's fondness for furs is enabling this country to turn its rabbit pest into a source of profit.
For many years multitudes of rabbits were slaughtered merely to keep them from destroying the crops. With the discovery, however, that the rabbit's coat could be dyed and made to look like a costly expensive fur, he became an asset instead of a liability.
Last year 15,000,000 rabbits were exported from New Zealand to the United States and England. Their skins were valued at upwards of \$4,000,000. Rabbit trapping has now become a well established and remunerative business.
The opossum is another animal which New Zealand is turning into profit. L. Amos takes most of the blue and grey opossum skins. The darker furs go largely to Great Britain.
Grand Jury Indicts Four.
ST. HELENS, Ore.—The grand jury empaneled for this session of the circuit court, made its report to Judge Kakin last Friday morning and was dismissed. Four indictments, one of them against, were returned. J. W. Harkness is held on a statutory charge, Ross Hillings with larceny and W. W. Stanley with threatening to kill.
