Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Stewed prunes with lemon, cereal, thin cream, scrambled eggs, cornmeal muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Apples stuffed with sausage, toasted muffins, tapioca cream pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner—Ham baked in sweet cider, glazed sweet potatoes, moiled spinach, stuffed beef salad, whole wheat bread, banana whip, mock angel food, milk, coffee.

A child under six years of age should not be served the apples stuffed with sausage. An apple should be baked without the stuffing for the junior member of the family. He will find a luncheon or crisp toasted muffins, milk, tapioca cream and baked apple both satisfying and nourishing.

Apples Stuffed with Sausage Six large apples, 1/2 pound bulk sausage, few grains cinnamon, 2 tablespoons sugar.

Wash apples and remove cores without breaking apples. Sprinkle the inside of each apple with cinnamon and sugar, using 2 tablespoons in all. Fill cavities with sausage and place in a shallow pan.

Surround the apples with hot water and bake in a moderately hot oven for 45 minutes. The water should be about 1/2 inch deep in the pan. Bake apples with the liquid in the pan while baking.

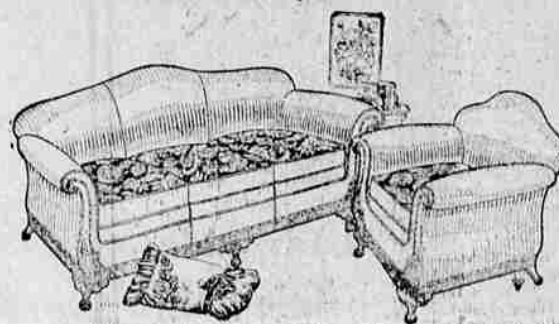
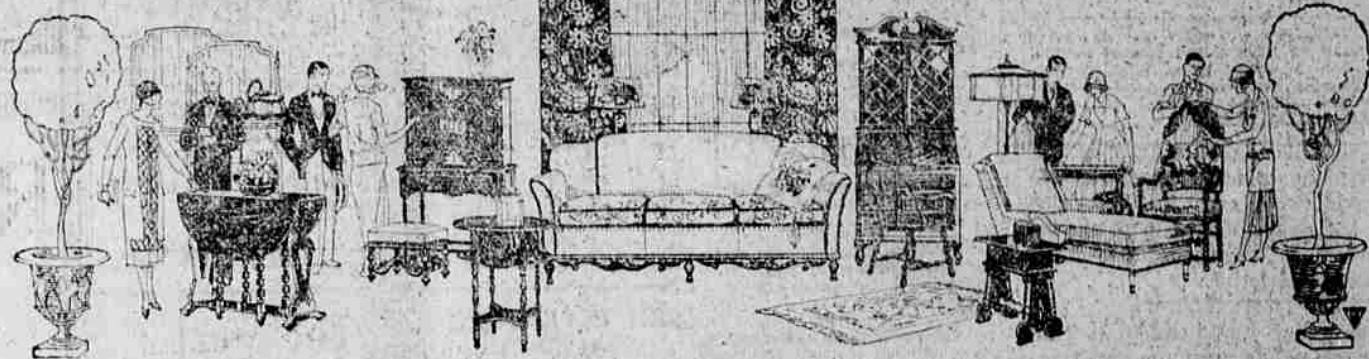
