Argentine Background Chosen for "The Dancers"

Those who saw the stage version of "The Dancers" in New York will recognize a slight change in the screen version of the New York and London stage success which has recently been completed at the Fox Film Corporation West Coast Studio and is now playing at the Arcade.

Scenes that in the stage production were laid in the Canadian northwest have been given the more romantic background of the Argentine republic in the picture directed by Emmett Flynn, who directed "The Connecticut Yankee" and "The Man Who Came Back" and numerous other Fox successes.

With George O'Brien, Almas Rubens and Madge Bellamy in the feature roles a notable supporting cast has been assembled including Walter McGrath, who has the difficult role of the Argentine, Noble Johnson, Templar Saxe, Joan Standing, Allen Hollister, Freeman Wood and others.

The screen version was made by Edmund Goulding who has also been prominently identified with several recent William Fox picture successes.

Strongheart The Greatest Fighter Of His Breed

Strongheart, who is as celebrated in the cinema world as in dogdom, is the greatest fighter of his breed in the world, and in his latest Trimble-Martin picture, an adaptation of Jack London's story "White Fang," which comes to the Sherry theater today he has a part which enables him to battle two and four legged enemies from one end of the story to the other.

Even as a puppy Strongheart showed unusual proclivities for fighting. He had unusual intelligence, was his for his size, had very powerful jaws and was fast on his feet. In many ways he resembles the former ring champion James J. Corbett in his methods. Corbett won the world's championship and international fame by his speed and method of hitting and getting away. Strongheart, when he fights, dashes in on his opponent with lightning speed, and like the wolf breeds, slashes with his fangs and gets away. He acts very much like a well trained boxer sparring for an opening, and whenever he sees this opening he dashes in, knocks his opponent off his feet and gets him by the throat.

But Strongheart has a great deal more than a dog's inherited knowledge of fighting, for, aside from his thorough European police training and actual experience he has been trained by the world's greatest experts how to fight every kind of two or four-legged foe. The most interesting accomplishment in this schooling was when trainers succeeded in teaching him to fight without injuring his opponent. Today two fighters can

put up a great battle and by "pulling their blows" that is, hitting without much force back of the blows they damage one another. In the same way Strongheart will, if directed to do so, fight either a man or another dog, put up a really sensational battle, and not hurt either one at all. It takes an unusual amount of intelligence and self control to do this, but these qualities the dog possesses to a high degree.

In "White Fang," Strongheart and Mathew Betz, who plays the part of Frank White, fought one another in the big climax of the story. It is an sensation. The battle scene, set in a library and all over the place wrecking furniture and decorations. During this time their clothes were stripped from his body, studied in ribbons by Strongheart's fangs, and yet when it was all over there wasn't even a scratch on the man's body. Strongheart had been "pulling his fangs."

Religious Schooling By Mail Tried for Isolated Children

CHICAGO (AP)—Religious instruction by mail for children in isolated and rural districts is the solution of the problem of those who live too far to attend Sunday school regularly, in the opinion of Miss Vera L. Noyes, supervisor of Religious Education in the Chicago diocese of the Episcopal church.

Miss Noyes has worked out a system that aims to bring religion into the every-day life of the child, "so that religion may be real, attractive and effective."

"Each week the pupil receives through the mail material which will not only cause the child to learn something, but also to think, and to do," she said. "The lessons are graded and planned to fit the needs of the various ages of childhood."

"And yet the correspondence is not for the child alone. It is creating in every home it touches a religious atmosphere."
