"Abie's Irish Rose" Booked at Arcade For October 31

The difficulty of exploiting racial and religious clashes lies in avoiding offensive material. Generally speaking, it is a good thing to avoid; but if the humorous aspect of the case can be shown in such a manner as will appeal to those most intimately concerned, while at the same time a general philosophy touches the sensitive features with the healing balm of common sense, then the experiment is worth trying. Miss Annie Nichols has done it successfully in "Abie's Irish Rose," a comedy dealing with the results of a marriage between a Jewish youth, son of a proud and intensely orthodox Hebrew, to the daughter of a typical Irish Catholic. This marriage takes place before a Methodist minister, and without knowledge of her parents. When Abie brings his bride to his father's home, however, he finds the old man's prejudice against him marriage with any but a Jewish girl strong and his hatred to anything Irish so keen, that he introduces Rose as Miss Murphree, of the orthodox faith. As such she is much more readily accepted, and despite her own and Abie's fears, all seems to be going well when her father, accompanied by an Irish Catholic priest, Father Whalen, arrives on the scene, as he thinks, to witness her marriage according to the Catholic faith. But as she has just been married for the second time, by a Rabbi, he is a trifle hot. The revelations of the secret marriage adds to the bitterness with which both Holoman Levy and Patrick Murphy take their respective children's union, and the clash of racial and religious prejudices and the resulting affairs, a basis upon which Miss Nichols has built up a comedy that holds more laughter than even in any show within the past twenty years.
