Tense and dramatic situations
 follow closely one upon the other

LONDON, (AP)—Miss Edith
 Wilson, who won the girls' golf
 champion ship of Great Britain,
 a only 15 years old, but she lacks
 only two inches of being six feet
 all, and weighs more than 150
 pounds. None of the other girls,
 and only few women, can whale
 into a golf ball as she can, or
 send it scooting such long distan-
 ces.

As yet there is little grace in
 her game, for she is at an awk-
 ward age and growing rapidly.
 But of power there is plenty.
 Several times during the champi-
 onship play at Stoke Poges she
 swished grooves of 440 yards or so
 with her second shot. And the
 grass was wet, giving little run to
 the ball.

Miss Wilson wears her hair in a
 pigtail, which, when playing, she

tucks down the back of her jer-
 sey.

The young champion took up
 golf at the age of nine. Her in-
 structor in recent years has been
 Arthur Havers, the open champi-
 on of 1923. She made her debut
 among the women players last
 May in the British ladies' champi-
 onship, being beaten by Mrs. W.
 A. Gavin on the 17th green.
