WIERINGEN, EX-CROWN PRINCE'S EXILE IS NOW JOINED TO MAINLAND

AMSTERDAM (AP)—Wieringen, which achieved worldwide notoriety through the place of exile of the German ex-crown prince William, is an island no more. It now forms part of the great Zuiderzee drainage scheme. A newly laid dam one and a half miles in length now unites Wieringen with the mainland. This is, however, only a small beginning. It may take Holland 20 years before realizing her ambition to add 1000 square miles to her territory by reclaiming the Zuiderzee, a project estimated to cost \$110,000,000.

OYSTER BED FOUND OFF COAST OF ARGENTINA

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—The discovery of an oyster bed covering nearly 400 square miles off the coast of Patagonia has been reported to the ministry of agriculture by the chief of the fisheries bureau, recently returned from a survey of the gulf of San Matias. The location of the oyster bed is given as about 20 miles south of Port San Antonio and at a depth varying from 15 to 20 meters below the level of the sea. The oysters are stated to be of excellent quality.

GERMANS FIND MORE POTASH

FRIEDRICH, Germany (AP)—Deposits of potash salts of an exceptional quality are reported to have been struck at a depth of 800 yards at Buddingen, potash works after three years of continuous borings. The concern, subsidized by the government of Baden, was established three years ago.
