TOWN BUDGET \$71,045 OREGON CITY, Ore.—Saturday, November 14, has been set by city officials as the date for the annual budget meeting of the taxpayers to consider the appropriations for the year 1926 for municipal expenses.

The budget committee, E. T. Beveridge, James A. Brady and Clarence Z. Parr, has put final touches to the budget.

The total amount to be raised by taxation this year amounts to \$71,045.46, with anticipated receipts from the county road fund less by \$4460 than they were last year. The budget shows the amount of each on hand at \$500 to be the same as before and receipts from licenses and flares have been estimated at \$7000.
