## Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast — Orange Juice, cereal cooked with dates, thin cream, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon — Cream of potato soup, eggless bran bread, pumpkin and cream cheese salad, ginger cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner — Braised beef, brown gravy, macaroni, buttered Brussels sprouts, candied fruit jelly, whipped cream, white bread, milk, coffee.

Luncheon is planned to take care of the needs of school children rather than adults. The person who would diet to reduce will find that a luncheon of a sandwich, fruit and tea is sufficient. One slice of the bran bread, a small salad and tea should be the reducing diet from the luncheon menu for the day.

## Eggless Bran Bread.

Two cups bran, 1 cup whole wheat flour, 1 cup buttermilk, 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 cup nuts, 1/2 cup seeded raisins, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Mix flour, bran and salt. Dissolve soda in buttermilk and add to dry ingredients. Add nuts and raisins and mix thoroughly. Turn into a well-buttered bread pan and bake one hour in a moderately slow oven.

## SKAMANIA TIMBER SOLD

HOOD RIVER, Ore. — One of the largest timber deals recently closed in the mid-Columbia was that in Skamania county last week, when the Hiram Sibley interests were sold to the Westport Lumber company of Portland. The timber included in the deal will cover about 200,000,000 feet. The logs will be carried to the Columbia river by logging railroad and rafted to Columbia City.
