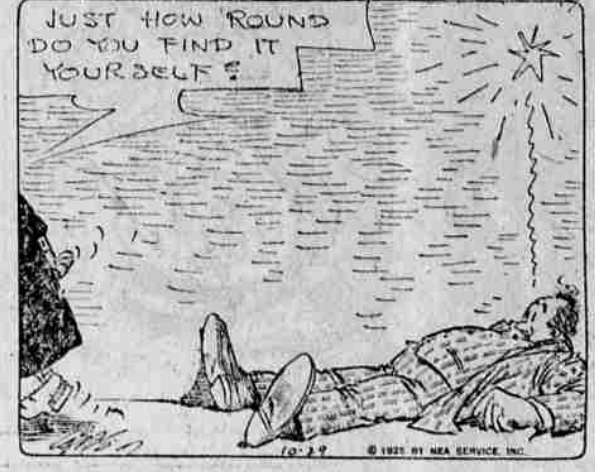

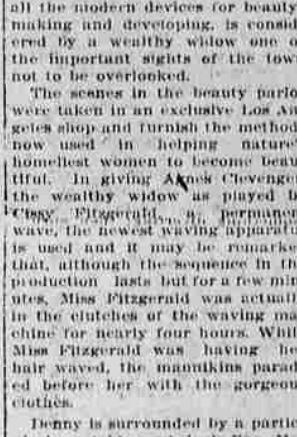

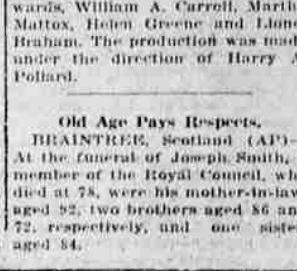
Old Age Pays Respects.
