## Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)  
Breakfast—Apples, cereal, thin cream, waffles, syrup, milk, coffee.  
Luncheon—Creamed oyster plant on toast, stuffed prune salad, graham bread and butter, sponge cake, milk, tea.

Dinner—Broiled pork chops, baked sweet potatoes, apple sauce, pea-potato-nut salad, bean rolls, raisin puffs, milk, coffee.

This dinner menu must be changed in many instances if wanted for children under 10 years of age. Lamb chops should be substituted for pork, the salad should be reduced to plain lettuce and a piece of sponge cake or crisp cookie be served with the apple sauce for dessert.

**Creamed Oyster Plant on Toast**  
One bunch salsify or oyster plant, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, few grains pepper, 1/4 teaspoon celery salt, triangles of toast.

Wash and scrape oyster plant and drop into water containing one tablespoon vinegar. This prevents the roots from discoloring. Cut in half-inch slices or dice and drain. Put into sauce pan, add boiling water to cover and cook until tender. Add salt after cooking for 10 minutes. "DRESS" and "ADD" to sauce made by melting butter and stirring in flour. Slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Add salt, pepper and celery pepper and cook 5 minutes after sauce begins to boil. Pour over hot buttered toast and garnish with parsley to serve. **\$25,000 ALIMONY ASKED**  
ASTORIA, Ore.—Action for divorce against her husband, Bruce & Trust company from disposing of

Adler Bates of Portland, was filed in the local circuit court by Dorothy M. Bates. The Title & Trust company of Portland is made a defendant in the suit, the complaint averring that the company holds property in trust for the defendant until he reaches the age of 40 years, and that the property is valued at \$100,000. The plaintiff asks \$25,000 gross alimony for herself and \$25,000 for the support of the two minor children of the couple, \$500 attorney fees for prosecuting the suit and \$50 court costs.

It is sought to restrain the Title & Trust company from disposing of

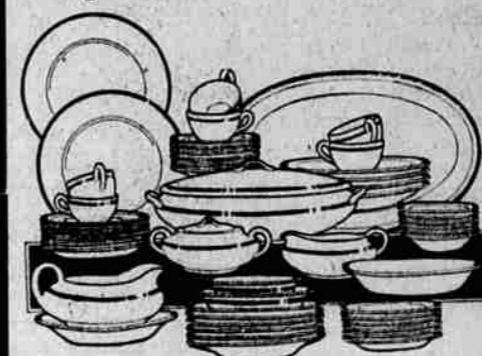
or encumbering the property held in trust for the defendant until the action for separation and alimony has been adjudicated. The plea of cruel and inhuman treatment, it being averred that the defendant has expressed contempt for the plaintiff and left home for extended periods of time.

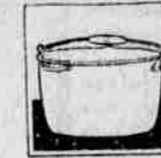
