## Sister Mary Says:

**BY SISTER MARY**  
Breakfast—Halves of grapefruit, cereal, thin cream, broiled bacon, creamed potatoes, milk, coffee, cranberry popovers.

Luncheon—Baked eggplant, bean and raisin bread, apple sauce, molasses, cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Baked fish, scalloped potatoes, baked squash, chive and egg bread, cranberry pudding, milk, coffee.

Pickles can be added to these menus at the discretion of the housewife. Very often in a family of grown-ups best pickles can take the place of a salad. The vegetables must be chosen with care when this substitution is made to insure plenty of bulk and mineral salts in the menu. Best pickles might well be added to this dinner menu just as it stands.

**Baked Eggplant**  
Two cups boiled and mashed eggplant, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 small onion, 1½ cups bread crumbs, ½ cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon pepper, 2 eggs. The soft part of the loaf should be used for the crumbs. Add to milk and let stand 20 minutes. Melt butter, add onion finely minced and cook until a pale straw

## The Garden

**Clean Up Vegetable Patch**  
A good vegetable gardener will clean off all the waste material this fall to have the patch quick and span for the spring. No cabbage stumps, old bean vines or other waste material lying around. It is an expert job to spread his garden this fall, turn under some of the bean and pea vines and lighter refuse and stack the heavier in his compost heap. It is an excellent idea to turn over the soil in the vegetable garden this fall and leave it to weather, particularly if it is of heavy or clayey nature. Fertilize the garden where you can follow the old time methods of spreading a heavy

coating of manure over the garden this fall. But this is getting to be rarer and rarer. We must now depend largely upon commercial manures and compost heaps for the humus forming materials. Reports from the experimental station at Rothamstead, England, tell us of new chemicals to convert our heaps of autumn leaves into manure in a few days' time, ready to put on the garden, but these chemicals haven't got here yet, so we shall have to make up in turning the soil for the lack of manure. This is the time to spade under the corny post heap that has been slowly decaying since last year, removing the bottom layers to spread over the garden while stacking up the fresh crop of autumn leaves, and weeds and lawn clippings to continue the process. Make the heap flat topped with an indentation in the center so that the water from rains will be directed into the center of the heap instead of being shed down the sides. In soil which shows an indication to be sour, it is a good plan to give a lime dressing in the fall, namely either hydrated lime or crushed limestone.

BERLIN (AP)—German women craving to be as slender as the fashionable American women, are trying every conceivable method, including some dangerous remedies, to get thin and stay thin, says Dr. Hermann Korsch, director of the University of Munich.

PARIS (AP)—While the New York flapper defies the autumn frosts in rolled stockings and skirts that fall to cover the knees, the smart Parisienne is letting down her skirts, continue to be contented, as the winds become more chilly. Skirt hems do not yet cover calves on the boulevards, but the models now on display in the smart dressmaking establishments that sell women's fashions for the world now display slightly longer skirts than they did in August.

The "little season" models, which means those on display now, are forecasts of what may be expected in the mode of next summer. Swarms of New York buyers are in Paris choosing clothes for the winter resort trade in America and nearly all the models they are buying have longer skirts than those now being worn in the United States.

If skirts continue their downward trend—and one leading designer prophesies that eventually they will cover the feet—knees may again become the vague rumors they were in Victorian days.

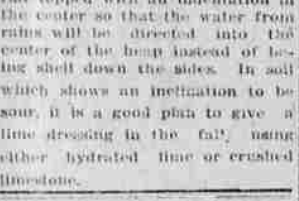
**TITLE IN IRELAND DOES NOT GUARANTEE WEALTH**  
DUBLIN (AP)—A title in Ireland is not a guarantee of means. At Cork, Sir Thomas Moore, the eleventh holder of one of the oldest British baronetcies, created in 1681, has just had an order of "jettison" made against him from his humble home because he had failed to pay a rent of 16 pounds. Sir Thomas is 81 years of age, and the magistrate put a stay of six weeks on the order.

The heir presumptive to the barony is the oldest surviving son of the ninth baronet, Sir Edmund Moore, who emigrated to the United States. The family motto is "The brave man may fall, but can never yield."

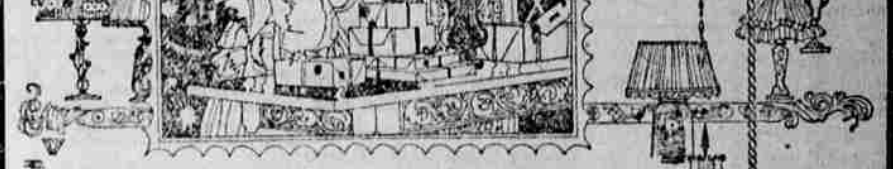
