COUNTY TAX RATIOS LOWER

SALEM, Ore. (By the Associated Press.)—On the average, county tax ratios for 1925 as finally approved by the state tax commission showing the relation of assessed property values to actual values are slightly lower than the 1924 ratios. This is according to a statement by members of the commission.

The Multnomah county ratio is placed at 54 as against 55 last year. The Marion and Polk county ratios remain at 56 and 44 respectively, while Lane is increased from 52 to 55. Jackson county

continues at .61. Deschutes is decreased from .49 to .46, Douglas reduced from .65 to .63 and Umatilla is decreased from .70 to .69.
