RED MAN'S TRIBE INCREASING.

For decades and for some reason, now unknown, the public has been under the impression that the American Indian has been rapidly approaching extinction as a race. Perhaps the average person, if examined on the subject, would express the belief that it is only a matter of a few generations before the last full-blooded Indian will have gone to his fathers.

It must have been with amazement coupled with incredulity that many received the census bureau's announcement of an increase of 2,693 in the country's Indian population during the year ended June 30. But one is puzzled even more by census figures showing a gain of 18,976 in the Indian population in the last twelve years, that there are 120,163 Indians in the state of Oklahoma and that there are now 6,135 Indians living in New York state.

Better living conditions, economic prosperity and the beneficial effects of civilizing influences probably account for the growing Indian population. That the race has survived to this time is remarkable, although there now seems to be no valid reason why it should not multiply. The red man is no longer made the target for the white man's rifle and many tribes have become fabulously wealthy from oil discovered on the Oklahoma lands the white man's government believed barren and worthless and therefore set aside as reservations for native Americans.
