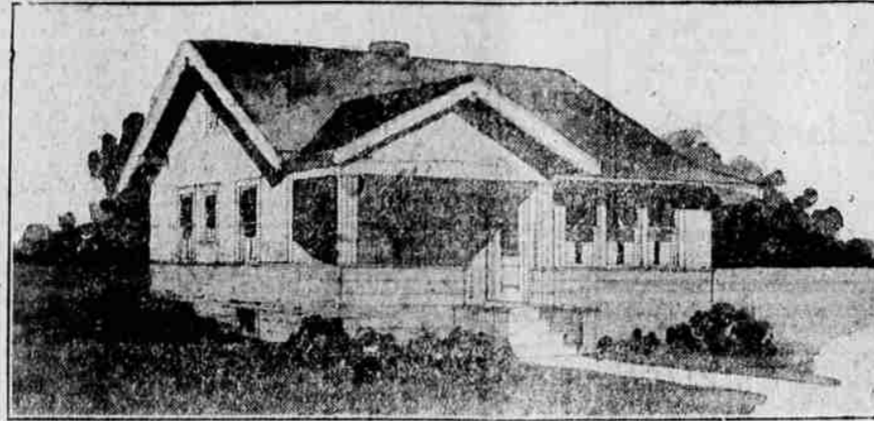

PAINT SHOP TO BE REMODELLED AT COST OF \$300

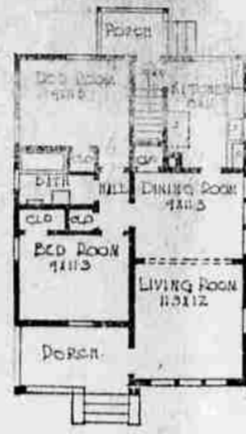

To those who have less than \$5000 to put into a home, today's type of bungalow is especially suited. Built of wide siding to the first story sills, stained a dark brown, painted a cream color, narrow siding above, this cozy little home can be built for between \$2900 and \$3700, exclusive of the plumbing and heating, according to the architect's estimate. This is one of the most economical homes possible and for the young married couple just starting out to build, it is an ideal plan.

One enters this little home by way of a front porch directly into the living room, in which there are four sunny windows. A wide doorway leads into the dining room which has three large windows, making an ideal place for house plants and flowers. The kitchen is arranged so as to save the housewife's steps and time, and there is a back porch. The bath room is conveniently located between the two bed rooms and there is ample closet space.

With its gleaming white walls, and a brilliant red or green roof with window trimmings to match, this little home would present a most attractive appearance.
