### United States Marine Corps 150 Years Old

In the activities of the United States Marine Corps, expressed in its slogan, "Semper Paratus" (Always Ready), have not been allowed to tarnish. The organization's inscription, which can be read on the blue and gold banners of the marines, "From the shores of Tripoli to the Halls of the Montezumas," describes only truthfully the ability of these versatile "web-footed soldiers."

After the march of a detachment of marines over nearly 600 miles of African desert, during the trouble between the young American republic and the Tripoli pirates in 1803, at which time the Americans stormed and captured the native fortifications at Derne and, for the first time in history, hoisted the unfamiliar flag of Stars and Stripes over an old world fortress, the marines claimed "the shores of Tripoli" for their own.

Years later, during the Mexican war, a division of marines was the first American troops to penetrate the Mexican capital and enter the Grand Plaza of the City of Mexico, hence their right to add "the halls of the Montezumas" to their banner.  
Competitions in every war fought by this country, and distinguished in remote campaigns from Formosa to Abyssinia and from Beering Straits to Valparaiso, the marines had gained a reputation long before their spectacular participation in the Battle of Belleau Woods in France, in June, 1918, when the final German advance was halted. That action, named in honor of the French government, officially, to remain that battle-field, "Bois de la Brigade de Marine."

**VISIBLE GRAIN SUPPLY.**  
NEW YORK (AP) — The available supply of American grains shows the following changes in bushels:  
Wheat decreased 722,000.  
Corn increased 278,000.  
Oats increased 3000.  
Rye decreased 299,000.  
Barley increased 368,000.

**WEEKLY GRAIN EXPORTS.**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Grain exports from the United States last week were 2,721,000 bushels as compared with 2,733,000 bushels the previous week.

Commerce department figures Monday gave the following comparisons between last week's exports and those of the week before:  
Wheat, 821,000 bushels against 1,023,000; rye, 72,000 against none; oats, 446,000 against 1,020,000; corn, 194,000 against 112,000; barley, 1,215,000 against 560,000.

Canadian grain exported through United States ports amounted to 1,734,000 bushels against 2,822,000 the previous week, while total wheat flour exports from North America were 415,000 barrels as compared with 365,000.

or use forced liquor permits.  
A statute authorizing the president to use designated ships and officers of the navy to prevent smuggling.  
A terminal tax on cereal beverages and industrial alcohol.

Each local community has equal responsibility for enforcement of the prohibition law, the resolutions declared, "but we cannot agree to any policy that minimizes the obligation of the federal government."
