Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary) Breakfast—Baked peas, cereal, thin cream, fried corn meal mush, sirup, milk, coffee. Luncheon—Vegetable soup, croquettes, rice and date pudding, milk, tea.

The vegetable soup suggested in the luncheon menu should be made with a meat stock. The vegetables are cooked separately in as little water as possible and added with any water clinging to them to the strained stock or they may be cooked in the stock. Cut the vegetables into small cubes and use them for "filling" as well as flavoring for the soup.

Rice and Date Pudding. One cup boiled rice, 12 dates, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Remove stones from dates. Beat eggs until light. Beat in sugar, salt and milk. Add rice, dates and vanilla and stir until thoroughly mixed. Pour into a buttered pudding dish and bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve warm or cold with or without cream.

This is a simple nourishing pudding—excellent for children or grown persons. If served very cold with whipped cream it makes an impromptu company dessert.

Nature Lovers Intervene to Save Tree 2800 Years Old SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—Washington's oldest inhabitant, a cedar tree 2800 years of age, has been spared the ax through the generosity of nature lovers of this state. It stands 200 feet high, 18 feet in circumference, and 18.4 feet in diameter.

The Washington National Parks association raised \$2000 by popular subscription to buy the monarch, together with 20 of its companions, which stand 25 miles from here. The land occupied by the grove will be set aside as a state park.
