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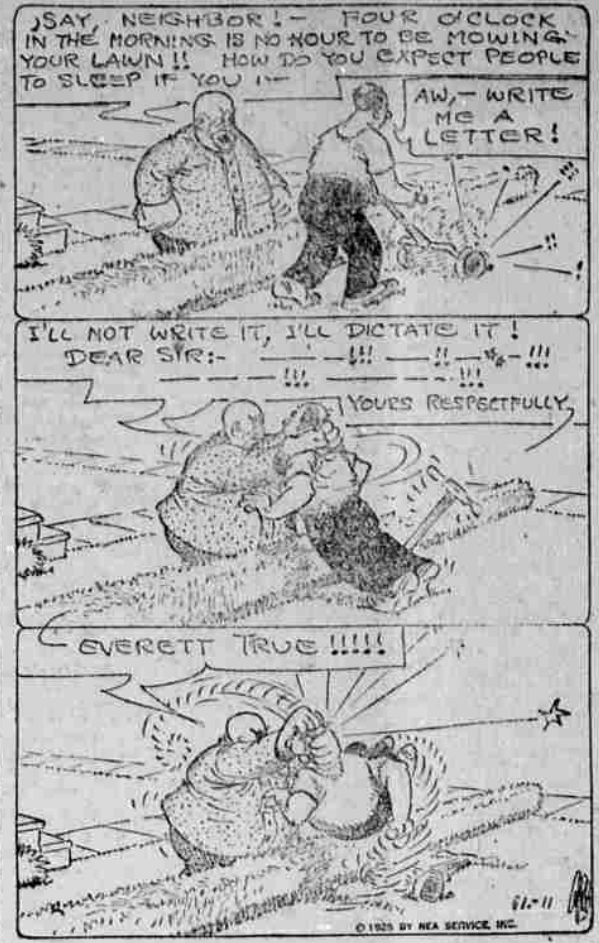

Mystery Story, "Raffles" For Noted Screen Star

It is a difficult task to make a mystery story in such a manner as to conceal the explanation until the last scene, but this is said to have been attained successfully in "Raffles," Universal-Jewel starring House Peters and coming to the Arcade theater Friday and Saturday. The picture is the screen version of some of the stories E. W. Hornung wrote around his character A. J. Raffles, amateur cracksmen who had Scotland Yard's best men by the heels as the result of his

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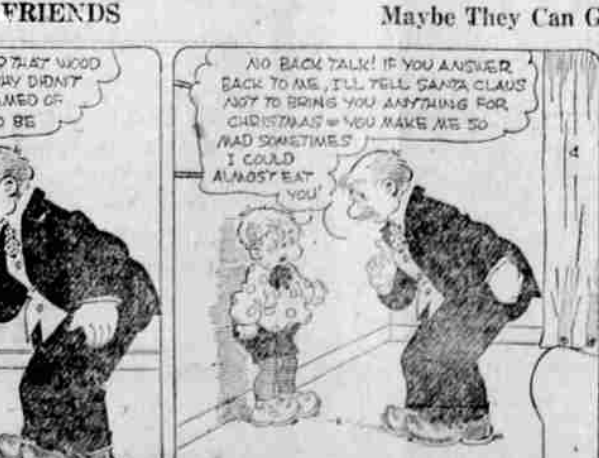
