tures as determined by the amount of sun's heat reaching the earth. The solar radiation for more than three years has been below normal. The present weather situation, he says, indicates that the world is facing a condition which will interfere seriously with crops, the cold fall and winter prospect being but forerunners of the next two years. A serious situation developing in the southern hemisphere in the crop year of 1926 to 1927 and in the northern hemisphere in 1927, is predicted.

That he is supported by a number of prominent scientists is demonstrated, Mr. Browne contends, by the published views of Dr. R. E. Sorenander, professor of botany in the Swedish National university. This scientist predicts the return of Scandinavia, and at least some sections of northern Europe of the "fabled winters" that is, three winters without intervening summers to the extent at least of a condition disastrous to the crops of northern Europe.

The views of Doctor Sorenander, Mr. Browne said, are supported by two other botanists of high standing, Dr. Holmud Gans of Stockholm and Dr. Bjor Norshagen of Norway. Doctor Gans recently quoted Mr. Browne as mentioning him among other Europeans "as supporting Mr. Browne's forecast that the year 1926 would be like 1816, the year without a summer," but Mr. Browne Wednesday said he had only quoted Doctor Gans as supporting the views of Doctor Sorenander.

As for 1816, when ice formed in the fields as far south as Pennsylvania, Mr. Browne says 1927, not 1926, will see a return of approximately these conditions, not necessarily with continued cold, but with sharp cold spells and other conditions, at intervals which will mean great damage to crops.

All factors, of which the condition of the sun is most important, Mr. Browne says, support his view. The sun, which is described by the Smithsonian institution and others as a variable star, is for some unknown reason in a period of low activity, which decreased radiation.

PROGRAM AT HOT LAKE
