Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)
Breakfast—Grapefruit, bacon and eggs, toast, coffee.
Luncheon—Riced potatoes with cheese, brown bread and butter, green tomato pickles, cakes, tea.
Dinner—Fresh shoulder of pork stuffed and roasted, potatoes baked with meat, brown gravy, apple sauce, endive, bread and butter, scalloped cranberries, coffee.
Riced Potatoes with Cheese.
Two cups potatoes, 1 cup milk, 1 egg, 1/2 cup cheese, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg.
Boat mill into potatoes and season with salt and pepper. Separate white and yolk of egg. Beat yolk till thick and add to potato mixture. Add cheese. Beat white till stiff and dry, and fold into mixture. Turn into a buttered baking dish and bake 20 minutes in a hot oven. Mashed potatoes may be used in place of riced potatoes and then less milk is necessary.

Scalloped Cranberries.
One pint cranberries, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 cups soft bread crumbs, 1-3/4 cup melted butter, 1/4 cup seeded raisins, sugar, grated lemon rind.
Butter a baking dish and put in a layer of crumbs. Wash and pick over cranberries. Parboil in water to which 1/4 teaspoon of soda has been added. Then boil for 10 minutes with sugar and a cup of water. Add a layer of cranberries to bread crumbs, sprinkle with a little sugar and a few raisins. Add a layer of crumbs, pour over butter, raisins and grated lemon rind. Add another layer of crumbs, pour over butter, cover and bake three-quarters of an hour in a moderate oven.
