STAR PLAYERS MEET ON GRID

NEW YORK (AP)—Five great struggles between individuals who have attained fame on eastern football fields will draw the cheers of thousands this afternoon.

Syracuse, Oberlin, Dartmouth's backfield marvel who two years ago played as a lineman, meets an exceptional foe in "Five Yards" McCarty of Chicago, a plunger who has gained his nickname through vicious attacks on opposing lines.

At Syracuse there is another great individual performer in the making, with Eddie Tryon, little halfback who conquered Princeton, playing for Colgate against Harlan Carr of Syracuse. They are of the running type, open field workers par excellence—dodging, twisting, nines to whom long runs around the ends and through the tackles are comparatively common.

At Kreson, hero of Pennsylvania's victory over Yale this season, will be pitted against the 155-pound Andy Gustafson, fullback of Pittsburg. They are plungers who hold their feet and do much of the leading for their teams, although it is reported that Kreson, as the result of an injury, may be unable to participate in his famous left toe on Saturday.

Harry Wilson, former Penn State star, now playing for the Army, will meet a worthy opponent in the brilliant Columbia captain and quarterback, George Plume, at the Polo grounds in New York.

Jackson Keefer of Brown, appearing against Harvard for the last time, will find his mettle tested by the Crimson captain, Dolph Check, who is regarded as a brilliant performer, who has seen Harvard suffer many reverses.

Keefer scored a touchdown against Yale with a 36-yard sprint from regular formation and his ability in an open field kept Dartmouth in doubt throughout three periods.

YALE CHOICE OF GAMBLERS

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—Odds have lengthened on most of the favorites in this Saturday's football battles.

Yale rules a 7 to 1 choice over Princeton, with a wager of \$2000 to \$1000, the largest reported on the basis of these odds, which have lengthened from 5 to 1.

Other wagers established Army an overwhelming favorite over Columbia at 3 1/2 to 1, with Pennsylvania, Dartmouth and Brown each quoted at odds of 5 to 1 over Pittsburg, Chicago and Harvard, respectively. Colgate is a 6 to 5 choice over Syracuse.

Wagers on the outcome of the Army-Navy classic here November 25 also have witnessed an increase of odds on the Army from 2 to 1 1/2 to one.

Billy Evans Says:

MEMORY OF CAMP. The memory of Walter Camp is to be perpetuated by a continuance of the selection of an all-American football team.

The idea was original with Mr. Camp. It has since been widely copied. In the past certain experts have selected teams that were possibly superior to Mr. Camp's, but none of them carried the prestige that went with his team.

When Walter Camp died last winter while attending a meeting of the rules committee, it created a big void in football circles. He will be missed.

What would become of the all-American football team, a creation of Camp's brain? Would the annual custom of naming a mythical eleven die out or would some method be devised for continuing it?

Any number of suggestions have been made as to how the all-American custom should be continued. Some have been logical, others not.

ALL-AMERICA. For over a score of years the all-American team has been published in Collier's. It has been looked forward to with great interest by players and fans. To be named on Camp's team was the ambition of every player.

It is impossible for any football expert to see more than a dozen names each fall. That means there are hundreds of capable players, many stars who he never sees in action.

In making a selection over so big a field, it was necessary for Mr. Camp to be guided by the advice of the sport authorities and coaches of the various sections of the country.

Collier's plans to continue the all-American team as originated by Walter Camp under the jurisdiction of Grantland Rice.

No one more capable than Grantland Rice could have been selected for the stellar honor of continuing the Walter Camp All-American.

Grantland Rice is a great writer and a noted football expert. He played the game at college, has lived it ever since. He is eminently fitted for the task.

ROCKNE'S SYSTEM. Coach Knute Rockne of Notre Dame is a mighty original cuss. Many football innovations have been due to the ingenuity of his brain.

Several years ago Rockne surprised the football world by starting practically an entire second team in a very important game. There was a method in Rockne's madness.

By so doing Rockne forced the first stringers of the opposition to expend their energy against his substitutes, while his regulars were conserving their strength on the sidelines.

Aside from the physical benefit to his stars, the element of psychology also figured strongly. The moment the substitute began to receive, Rockne would rush in his regulars. If the opposition, despite every effort, had been unable to score on the second stringers, it certainly didn't help their morale to have the stars rushed into the fray, just when it looked as if a touchdown was in sight.

Many coaches have resorted to Rockne's tactics, but it remained for Georgia Tech to pull a new angle in a recent game with Notre Dame.

SOUTHERN STYLE. When the two teams lined up for the opening kickoff there was only one regular in the Georgia Tech lineup. It was Notre Dame, stuffed with reserve football.

Rockne, when he resorted to the substitute stunt, always did so with the thought that he would eventually win the game. His strategy in using second stringers was to bring such a thing to pass.

However, when Georgia Tech put all but one substitute on the field to oppose Rockne's team, the southerners had practically given up all hope of winning.

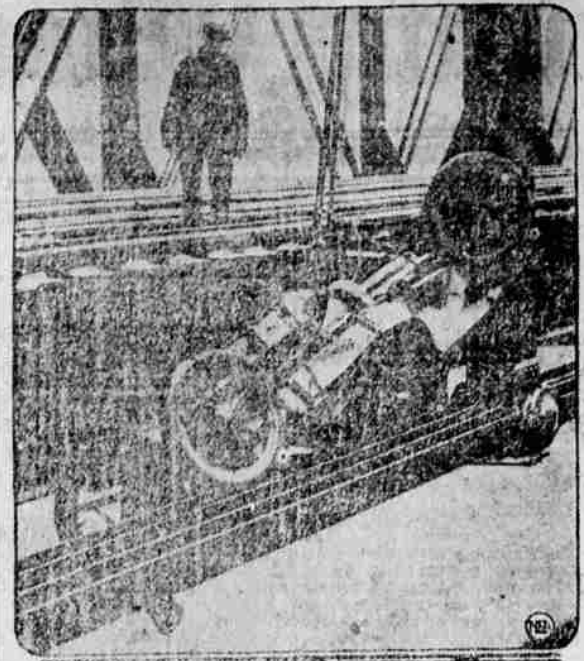
Then, after the comeback of Rockne's team against Minnesota, suddenly decided Notre Dame was too strong.

It was deemed better to try out the reserves and save the regulars for several big games, still to be played with leading southern teams. Defeating them meant more to Tech's prestige in the south than a victory over Rockne's pupils.

The funny part of it was that Notre Dame wasn't going so good that day and the regular Georgia Tech team might have stood a good chance of winning.
