Sister Mary Says:

BY SISTER MARY

Breakfast — Grapes, cereals, toast, coffee.

Luncheon — Omelet with tomato sauce, brown bread and butter, preserves, tea.

Dinner — Spanish steak, baked white potatoes, bananas and peanut salad, cake, coffee.

Spanish Steak

Round steak, 2 medium-sized onions, 1 quart tomatoes.

Have steak cut one-inch thick. Bear on both sides in a hot frying pan. Put in a casserole with a little water and cover with onion sliced very thin. Cover and bake in a medium oven for 40 minutes.

Four over-strained tomatoes and luke 40 minutes longer uncovered. Remove to platter, cover with cheese grated or cut in tiny pieces and return to oven long enough to melt cheese.

Banana and Peanut Salad

Shell and hull peanuts and put through the food chopper. Split bananas lengthwise and scrape off the outer surface. Roll bananas in chopped nuts, arrange on lettuce and serve with boiled salad dressing.
