INSTRUCTION IS CENTRAL IDEA

"Improved classroom instruction is the central idea in our education campaign in the La Grande schools this year," declared Superintendent J. T. Longfellow this morning. "The teacher is the vital point in any school system. Every other element is secondary. All of our activities, all our expenditures center about the effort for improved classroom instruction. It isn't the teacher's methods that counts so much as his attitude toward her work. Methods are only tools, and everyone knows that two workmen with the same kind of tools and identical material may turn out very different products. My definition of a good teacher? 'I can best give you that by quoting a recent letter that I sent out to the teaching staff—part of it my own, and part of it quoted from an education writer who signs himself W. H. J. 'Two teachers are working side by side, teaching the same grades, doing the same work, and supposedly getting the same results. But—' 'One has a strong and pleasing personality; the other is colorless. 'One shakes hands with a firm, warm grip; the other drops her hand into yours like a wet codfish. 'One is kindly and sympathetic; the other indifferent. 'One inspires love of work; the other inspires indifference or downright hatred of work. 'One is loyal to all that is best; the other not disloyal, but disloyal. 'One teaches living souls; the other teaches facts. 'One travels the sunlit heights; the other the narrow ravine. 'One lives to teach; the other teaches to live.'"
