French Short Story Discussed by Club

With dramatic portents and interpretations that revealed long and sympathetic study, Mrs. Lucile Carter Hendrickson led a large company of Neighborhood club members to a better understanding of the French short story Tuesday afternoon at the meeting in the clubrooms at the library building.

The stage was set in a reproduction of a French interior, softly illuminated by shaded lamps. All who took part in the program, including the musicians, remained on the platform throughout the afternoon.

White stories differ little from other short stories. Mrs. Hendrickson explained, it must be agreed that French writers are versatile, fearless, trained in form, and gifted with poignant sensibility and a feeling for language. She selected Balzac, Maupassant, and Daudet as representative of the three different types of French authors and stories.

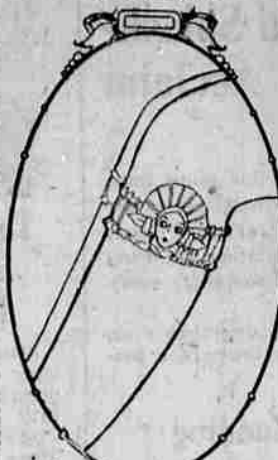
Of Balzac, she said that "his southern father and his Parisian mother combined their household disciplines in the brain of their son." His outstanding quality she gave as "an ability for work and a love of the dramatic and the absurd."

Then sketching Balzac's story of "The Accursed House," which she explained as a story of damnation, Mrs. Hendrickson found in it the elaboration of the thought expressed by Paul in Ephesians vi:12, "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against rulers of darkness of this world."

Mrs. J. A. Tedford and Mrs. Lynn Wright played Debort's "Savonice Dances" as a piano duo during the interval between stories.

Mrs. Hendrickson next gave a brief biography and analysis of Maupassant, whom she termed the criteria for the modern short story, and the completest exponent of the

doctrine of naturalism.

As an example of Maupassant's art, "The Confession" was read by Mrs. W. P. McArdy, whose appearance in peasant costume lent atmosphere to the presentation.

The story was interpreted by Mrs. Hendrickson as a portrait of heredity, in which a distorted image of the mother's cupidity appears in the act of the daughter as adulteress. Maupassant's "Elegie" was then played on the violin by Mrs. Marceney Lynch Miller in anticipation of the spirit of the concluding story. Mrs. Wright accompanied the solo.

Daudet, a child of nature, Mrs. Hendrickson explained as a writer unshowered by suffering, unspolied by success.

Miss Mabel Doty read the selected story, "The Two Inns," which the leader termed "the sum of life, and all of death."

Mrs. Hendrickson concluded her analysis with three word pictures of what she would have painted had she been laying the three themes on canvas.

The French national anthem, "La Marseillaise," was played as a piano duo by Mrs. Tedford and Mrs. Wright as the final number of the afternoon.

Announcement of the committee's success in providing a 100 per cent subscription to the Federation News bulletin was made at the business meeting by Mrs. G. L. Larison, chairman. Mrs. C. H. Seranton, president, presided over the session.

Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Oranges, cereal, thin cream, creamed fresh beef, on toast, whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Baked cheese sandwiches, head lettuce salad, jellied peaches, crisp cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Stewed chicken, gravy, noodles, baked squash, jellied cabbage salad, canned peaches, sponge cake, rye bread, milk, coffee.

No potatoes are suggested in this menu as the noodles supply the starch. Noodles do not furnish the mineral salts found in potatoes so a salad particularly rich in these nutrients is planned.

Hakali Cheese Sandwiches—Eight slices bread, 1/2 pound cheese, 2 cups milk, 3 tablespoons butter, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 1/2 teaspoon paprika. Cut cheese in thin slices. Butter bread lightly and make sandwiches filled with cheese. Arrange in a shallow baking dish. Heat very slightly, add milk and seasonings and pour over sandwiches. Bake in a moderately hot oven until a golden brown. Serve at once. Pickles should be served with this dish if planned for grown persons. (Copyright, 1925, NEA Service.)
