GERARD WANTS CATHOLIC OR JEW FOR PRESIDENT
 NEW YORK (AP)—James W. Gerard hopes that one of the major parties will nominate either a Catholic or a Jew for president.

Presiding at a meeting of the Jewish Tribune forum Sunday night, he said such a nomination would "do away with the miserable spirit of intolerance which has grown up in the land."

With the expression of his hopes the former democratic ambassador to Germany gave the following warning: "When any one race goes to a political convention and demands recognition for one man because of his religion or that race, it is increasing intolerance."

BLAZER FLATLY REFUSES TO REAPPEAR IN COURT
 DENVER, Colo. (AP)—Plans of Lewis Mowers, attorney for Dr. Harold Elmer Blazer during his recent trial at Littleton, Colo., on a charge of slaying his crippled and imbecile daughter, Hazel, to bring the doctor to trial a second time to secure for him immunity from further prosecution for the same offense, went awry Monday when the aged physician flatly refused to appear in court again.

AUTOS CLAIM 14 LIVES
 CHICAGO (AP)—Automobile mishaps accounted for 14 of more than a score of accidental deaths in the middle west over the week end. Five were killed in St. Louis, four in Chicago and vicinity, two in Omaha and three in Fort Madison. The automobile toll for the entire week in nine central states mounted to 117, the highest figure registered for some time. Ohio topped the list with 35 deaths, followed by Indiana with 21, Illinois with 18 and Michigan with 17. Minnesota reported 9, Missouri 7, North Dakota, Nebraska and Oklahoma 2 each, and Kansas 1.

LINCOLN COUNTY GETS RAIN

Governor's Room Will Show Human Virtues

LINCOLN, Neb., (AP)—Virtues of the human race will be exemplified in mural decorations which will adorn the governor's reception room of Nebraska's new \$9,000,000 statehouse.

Augustus Vincent Tack, New York artist, has in mind the wish of the late Bertrand G. Goodhue, architect, who designed both the capitol and grounds, that the governor's official room be made "the most beautiful room in the world."

The side and end walls will express the virtues of the state. The end wall at which is the fireplace will represent the state on the right as the provider of learning in its universities and schools and on the left as the protector of the sick and helpless in its hospitals and asylums. The opposite wall will represent the idea of equality before the law in which will be seen all sorts of men. In this panel the law itself is represented by the seven ancients of the law, who stand in judgment before the procession of human beings.

Transfusion Operations on Sick Trees Are Successful

AUBURN, Cal. (AP)—Transfusion operations on sick trees, with solution of terrous sulphate, showing the character of advanced blood, are being made successfully in California. Diseased trees have been brought into prairie forests.

Dr. C. H. Lippman, professor of plant physiology at the University of California, said when here that the treatment promised to eliminate such plant scourges as aphid and the blight.

The tree is treated as gently as a human. A hole is bored about three-quarters of the way through the trunk, and a glass tube inserted and sealed in with specially prepared wax. A bottle reservoir is placed at the height of the tree top and is connected with the glass tube by a hose. Thus the solution flows gently into the tree and is absorbed.

BAKER BUDGET LARGER
 BAKER, Ore.—The 1926 budget of Baker shows an increase of about \$6000 over last year in the amount to be raised by taxation, which is fixed at \$95,093.32. The budget has just been adopted by the committee and the city commissioners.

Part of the increased budget will be offset by an estimated increase of \$25,240 in the city's assessment. The figures last year were \$5,847,892; for this year they are estimated at \$5,906,142. The exact amount is not known as the public utilities are assessed by the state. The millage rate may show a small increase. The bonded debt of the city is \$12,000 less than a year ago.
