Patsy Ruth Miller Stars in "Girl on the Stairs"

Mystery that mystifies throughout dramatic situations that hold the spectator's unwavering attention, interspersed with delightful comedy bits, combine to make "The Girl on the Stairs" a thoroughly worthwhile motion picture. The play is an Elmer Harris production with pretty Patsy Ruth Miller starred and the story is an original treatment by Harris or Winston Brown's magazine story; at Sheriff's.

The story has for its heroine a young girl somnambulist who is accused of a murder committed during one of her sleep walking strolls. To tell the outcome of the story would be to deprive future spectators of the thrill that was accorded the writer on witnessing the picture last evening. But suffice it to say that the story is told in a thoroughly logical manner and brought to a satisfactory and logical close.

The cast that surrounds Miss Miller is a good one. Niles which makes a good-looking and convincing character of the defense attorney, the girl's sweetheart, Freeman Wood is at his best as the villainous Wakefield. Arline Pretty appears to advantage as Wakefield's wife, while two other important roles are capably handled by Bettina Grayson and Freeman Wood.

Technically, "The Girl on the Stairs" is without fault. Great care is revealed in the manner in which the court room and prison scenes were handled. The production was directed by William Worthington under Harris' personal supervision and photographed by

Joseph Walker and Charles Kaufman.
