PLANT CITY, Fla. (AP)—S-r-r-a-w-b-e-r-r-r-r-c-e-s! This mid-summer cry in Northern and Western cities will soon be echoed here when the Florida berry growers begin gathering their crops. The greatest yield of the local fields comes shortly after Christmas when thousands of crates are shipped to distant markets.

Strawberries require a special method of cultivation, involving extensive irrigation systems and constant field work. The crops in this vicinity are valued at more than a million dollars a year and the strawberry acreage is constantly increasing.

Buddhist Priests Trained For Japanese Suffrage Campaign

ORAKA, Japan (AP)—Three thousand Buddhist priests are being trained to take up the campaign in behalf of universal suffrage. Universal suffrage will be tried out in Japan for the first time at the next election, which may come next year.

In the training schools lectures are given every day by scholars and high officials in government departments. When the course is completed the priests will instruct hundreds of other priests and then the nation-wide campaign will start.
