FLASHY SPORT CARD BOOKED

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Florida, paradise of real estate traders and resort of the Southland, will have one of its greatest sporting seasons this winter and next spring.

Every hamlet and city from Key West on the extreme south and Fort Myers on the southwest, to Jacksonville on the north and Pensacola on the extreme northwest, have arranged to participate in the program.

The feature event will be the Miami running horse race meeting. The Miami Jockey club, with more than \$400,000 in purse prizes offered, gets underway January 21 and closes March 13. Indications are that again this year the track will attract America's foremost turfmen.

Three winter baseball circuits are planned, one to be a fast major and high minor league player loop on the east coast; another to be a six club circuit and the third an extensive Lake County affair.

Football in Lead. Football claims a leading role in the early winter sport drama. Two major college games have been scheduled, one between Washington and Lee and the University of Florida, to be played in Jacksonville on Thanksgiving day, and the other a dedicatory affair for the Coral Gables Stadium at Miami on December 5, between Rollins college of Winter Park, Fla., and Oglethorpe university, Atlanta.

Golf tournaments of national interest will be played, the events probably following the usual cycle as to sites—St. Petersburg, to Belaire (Clearwater), to Tampa, to Miami, to Palm Beach, to Daytona, to St. Augustine.

A feature of the season is the probability of a match between Walter Hagen and Bobby Jones. Jones, with Tompa Armour, another amateur, will play two professional on the Coral Gables course near Miami in January.

The professional golf league, formed last year, may have another schedule of games. Last season Leo Diegel and Gene Sarazen, playing for the Hollywood club, won the title.

Already under way is the Central Florida Amateur Golf league in which teams representing Daytona, Eustis, Deland and Sanford are playing.

The Miami Riviera trophy has been offered by George E. Merrick in an amateur golf championship tournament of Florida, to be played on the Coral Gables course. Invitational professional tournaments there with prizes aggregating \$5000 are planned.

Golf Attraction. The attraction for professional golf stars is the "winter championships of America," to be played in St. Augustine on March 15-20. The Winter Golf championship of Florida will be played there on March 22-27, while the East Coast Women's Golf championships will be an "Ancient City" event, March 9-13. Unlike to those tournaments will be the select St. Augustine championships, January 15-22 and the tenth annual golf tournament on February 16-20.

Tennis will be featured at Miami, Palm Beach and Jacksonville. An invitation has been extended by the Coral Gables club to William Tilden, II, to make his headquarters at Miami this winter. The French tiash, La Costa, also has been asked to come.

"Squaired circle" contests that will likely attract lovers of national prominence have been booked at Jacksonville, Orlando, Palm Beach, Miami, and Tampa, particularly at the latter two places. Boxing, however, is officially banned in this state, a statute being in effect against such contests.

Entering the lists comes the National Open Winter Lawn Bowling tournament, which gets under way at St. Petersburg on January 25. Like meetings will be held at Orlando and other cities.

Horseshoe Pitching. The horseshoe pitching center, which has been gradually shifting from the east to the west coast, is at St. Petersburg this winter, where the national tourney will take place. Lake Worth, Tampa, Lakeland, Orlando and Daytona also have these contests scheduled.

At St. Petersburg, the National Hoque Championships are scheduled for either February or March.

The swimming and diving competition will center in the West Palm Beach-Miami sector and in the St. Petersburg-Tampa area.

At Coral Gables, state championships for both men and women will be run off in the Venetian pool. A bid has been made for the men's and women's national swimming championships there.

FAIR HARVARD. What's the matter with Harvard? The alumni are chanting that line and what's more they want to know.

Princeton's overwhelming defeat of the Crimson was just about the last straw. Had Harvard been able to defeat either Princeton or Yale, the previous failures of the present season would have been forgotten.

The chance to defeat the Tiger resulted in an awful flop. Princeton this year gave Harvard the worst whipping it has ever received.

The score, 24-0. It is possible that the Crimson eleven is in for even a worse beating from Yale than the Princeton slaughter.

Either there is something wrong with the coaching system at Harvard or the Cambridge institution is no longer getting the cream of the scholastic athletes as was once the case.

It looks as if the time had arrived for a housecleaning somewhere. Certainly something is radically wrong with Harvard athletics.

COACHING SYSTEM. Being more familiar with the baseball situation than that of football, it is my belief that the coaching system in vogue for the diamond sport is all wet.

Several years ago Harvard decided to get away from the professional coach in baseball. By the pro coach, I mean a former big league star in the role of baseball mentor.

Princeton and Yale on the other hand go in strong for the big league college coach. For years Bill Clarke, in his day one of the best of the big leaguers, has been in charge of baseball at Princeton.

Recently Jack Coombs former famous big league pitcher, was made his assistant. Yale has the great Joe Wood of other days and Clyde Knipe. Both served for years in the majors.

Harvard went from the professional to the graduate coach and ever since has been trailing in "Big Three" baseball.

IN BASEBALL. During the progress of the game baseball demands much more direction from the bench than does football from the sidelines.

The field general must handle the game on the gridiron but the baseball coach by a signal from the bench can change the entire system of play in the twinkling of an eye.

The baseball coaching system is all wrong at Harvard if the Crimson hopes to make things interesting for Yale and Princeton on the diamond.

What's the matter with football is a tougher proposition to solve. Perhaps the fault is 50-50, divided among the players and coaches.

COLLEGE DEGREE IS ADDED TO COLLECTION

LEXINGTON, Va. (AP)—A photographic copy of the college degree received by George Washington has been added to the collection of relics of founders of Washington and Lee University here.

Dr. Henry Louis Smith, president, said that so far as can be learned the only degree ever conferred upon Washington was L.L.B. by Washington College, Maryland.

The copy of the diploma was donated by a New York attorney. The original is in the library of Congress at Washington. Washington was incidentally connected with the early history of the institution now known as Washington and Lee University, having endowed it and officially authorized it to use his name.

Americans Seeking Pedigree

Bring Out Oxford Skeletons

OXFORD, Eng. (AP)—American pedigree hunters have invaded the Oxford libraries. The skeletons of forgotten ancestors resident in almost every one of the United States have asked the university librarian to bridge some vast gulf in their patronymies.

A large percentage of the inquiries are coming from states in the middle west and the Pacific coast. It is considered fortunate for the genealogists and the College of Liberals that ancestor worship has found a home across the water, for its popularity is fast waning here. Historical researches show that many of the great men of the past were scoundrels, rogues and rascals for whom complete oblivion was the most kindly fate. Even the postage is not without its elevated skeletons.

MRS. MARY CUSHING DIES

THE DALLES, Ore.—Mrs. Mary P. Cushing, 52, Eastern Oregon's oldest woman pioneer, both in age and length of residence, died at the home of a son, William H. Cushing, on the Columbia highway, three miles from The Dalles. Mrs. Cushing had been a resident of Wasco county since 1852. She was born in Ireland in 1823 and, in company with a sister, came to New York while the girls were in their teens. In November, 1852, she took ship for the Oregon country, coming around the Horn with the family of Major G. C. Haller, who, with a regiment of 45 men,

was destined for old Fort Dalles. In 1854 she was married to Milo M. Cushing, who had come to Oregon as a soldier under Colonel Bonneville. This marriage was the first one solemnized in this district after the organization of Wasco county. Mr. Cushing died a turn-of-years ago. Several children were born of the union, although but two sons survive, Milo M. Cushing Jr. of Mayville and William H. Cushing of this city.
