lotte, bran bread, milk, coffee.

A pouched egg on graham toast should be served to a child under school age in place of the pork and sweet potatoes suggested in the dinner menu. The cauliflower and celery are suitable for small children.

Apple Compote.

Five or six apples, 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar, 1/2 cup water, 1-2 cup blanched and shredded almonds, 1 lemon, 1/2 cup whipping cream, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Pare and core apples. Dissolve 1 cup of sugar in the water and boil about five minutes, until syrupy. Add grated rind and juice of lemon and apples. Cook apples until tender. The syrup must be dipped over the apples and the apples turned frequently to cook evenly. Keep the fire low as rapid cooking will break the fruit. When the apples are tender remove to a serving dish or individual plates. Put remaining sugar into a heavy sauce pan or small iron spider. Add almonds and stir over moderate fire until sugar melts and turns a bright straw color. Pour this caramel over the tops of the apples. Reduce the syrup in which the apples were cooked and pour around apples. Chill and serve with whipped cream and sweetened with powdered sugar and delicately flavored with vanilla.

Young children should be served an apple prepared without the nuts.
