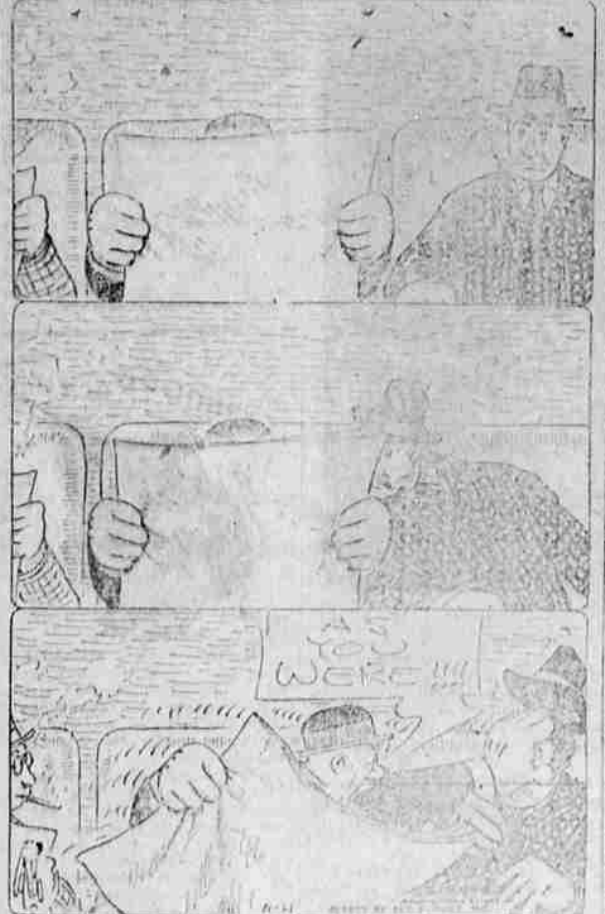
Interclass Girls Basketball—The senior and junior girls met recently for their first interclass basketball game of the season. The Junior girls defeated the seniors.

MAIL ORDER SALES INDICATE SOME HAIRDRESSING INCREASES

CHICAGO (AP)—Hairdressing at home appears to be on the increase in the United States. Three of the largest mail order houses here report increases of from 35 to 75 per cent in the sale of hair clippers during the last year and a half.
