CLUB WORK IS TOASTED AT DINNER (Continued from Page One.) rincipal and a leader in club work, gave a talk expressing appreciation of the stock show people and the parents who support and encourage the work of the club members. He said: "When I came here in 1921 there was only one club and at that time about two men interested in the work. They were Andrew Blokland and E. A. Sayre, who at that time was head of the Island City schools." Mr. Caldwell introduced each of the club members who exhibited stock at the Pacific International Livestock show in Portland this year, who in turn gave their names and the community in which they live and a report of their winnings at the Pacific International. Phy Addresses Meet Dr. W. T. Phy gave a splendid talk of encouragement to the boys. He mentioned the excellent work of Marvin Daniels and his association with him in dairy work. He closed by saying he would offer a registered Holstein heifer for club work next year. Final arrangements for the contest for the heifer will be made later by Dr. Phy and H. G. Avery. L. J. Allen, assistant state club leader, gave a short summary of the work of the club in the state, stating that there were over 11,000 club members working in the state of Oregon. Robert Wilbycombe of the Union experiment station, and a member of the stock show board, said they would be glad to have the boys visit at the experimental farm and take part in the show in even greater numbers than ever before. Sayre Makes Report E. A. Sayre, county school superintendent, in charge of the girls' club work in the county, was introduced by Mr. Caldwell as "a man who was elected county school su-

perintendent on account of his interest in club work." Mr. Sayre said: "It is good to acknowledge that it is a fact." He reported the work of the girls in the county, which has been excellent this year, and told the boys they would work hard if they continued to keep their record as good as that of the girls. Andrew Blokland of Island City told of his various visitors to the Pacific International Livestock show and mentioned that he considered this work fine training for boys. He said that in all his contact with club members at the exposition he had never heard one use an obscene word and had never seen one of the boys smoking cigarettes. Frank McKenna spoke for the timber community and said that the club members in that section were some of the best boys in the district. He also called attention to the fact that some of the prominent winners in the county and state were from that vicinity, including this year's stock judging team. J. E. Mills, who is one of the many club supporters of Cove, gave a brief talk about that section of the county and said that people there were ready to have the young folks enroll in club work even stronger than before next year. Mrs. Earnest Bell of Cove sang a song which was improvised into a toast to the club members and Andrew Blokland in particular. Baby Beef Auctioned William Vogel of the Union Stock Show association, then auctioned off the two front quarters of the baby beef and 22 pounds of airborn cuts. M. S. Levy bought one of the front quarters for 20 cents a pound and L. A. Wright bought the other quarter at 25 cents a pound. C. C. Conrad bought the sirloin steak in behalf of the club and people present as a whole, paying 60 cents a pound, which was presented to the Union people by Mr. Conrad to be used by them in giving a banquet for the Union football team this week.
