

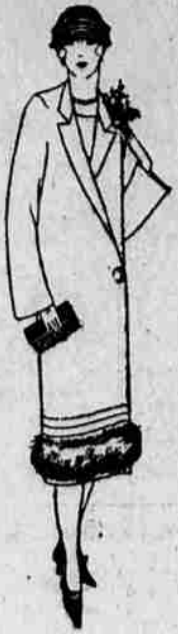

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Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Halves of grapefruit, scrambled eggs with rice, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of onion soup, toast sticks, lettuce and celery sandwiches, rice pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner—Broiled sirloin steak, French fried potatoes, creamed cauliflower, cabbage and pineapple salad, nut cookies, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

A child under school age may not eat French fried potatoes but he may have two tablespoons of finely cut, rarely broiled steak. A piece of bread dipped in the "platter gravy" after the steak is carved is a concession to babyhood that is particularly good for his small self. He may also have some of the cauliflower. His salad should be of finely shredded lettuce and his dessert be a dish of rice pudding left from luncheon.

Cream of Onion Soup One cup thinly sliced onions, 2

tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons bacon fat, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 1/2 cups milk, 1 egg, salt and pepper, 1/2 cup cream, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.

Melt butter and bacon fat in saucepan without letting the fats bubble. Add onion slices and cook over a low fire for 30 minutes. Keep the pan closely covered, letting the onions cook in their juice and steam. When the onions are soft add flour and stir with a fork until thoroughly blended. Add milk, salt and pepper and bring to the boiling point, stirring constantly. Let boil five minutes and rub through a fine strainer. Add egg slightly beaten and reheat over hot water if necessary. Whip cream and serve a spoonful sprinkled with minced parsley on each portion. (Copyright, 1925, NEA Service.)

Breakfast—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, baked hash with tomato sauce, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Baked macaroni with cheese, fruit salad, brown bread, sugar cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Cream of Lima bean soup, toasted crackers, stuffed baked potatoes, baked spinach and mushrooms, head lettuce with Roquefort cheese dressing, scalloped

cranberries, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

No meat is used in the dinner menu but a well-balanced, nourishing and appetizing meal is suggested.

Little bits of canned fruit have a way of accumulating during the winter months that can be used to good advantage in salads. Half a canned pear, a peach, a slice of pineapple and a canned quince can be cut into neat cubes, combined with as much apple as needed for "filling" with a mild boiled dressing to bind the mixture and served on crisp leaves of lettuce. If company is present a few nuts can be sprinkled over or seeded and skinned California grapes can be used as a garnish.

And the juice from canned fruit is delicious added to fruit drinks or thickened with cornstarch for pudding sauces.

Scalloped Cranberries One pint cranberries, 3-4 cup sugar, 2 cups stale bread crumbs from soft part of loaf, 4 tablespoons melted butter, 1-2 cup seeded raisins, grated rind of one lemon.

Wash and pick over cranberries. Pour boiling water through berries in a colander. Put into sauce pan with sugar and one cup of boiling

water. Boil five minutes. Butter baking dish and put in a layer of crumbs. Sprinkle with melted butter and cover with a layer of cranberries. Sprinkle with raisins and grated lemon rind. Add another layer of crumbs, sprinkle with butter and cover with remaining cranberries and raisins. Sprinkle with grated rind. Cover with remaining crumbs, pour over butter and bake 40 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve with sugar and cream. (Copyright, 1925, NEA Service.)
