Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary) Breakfast—Baked apples, cereal, thin cream, hopped bacon, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Tomato bouillabon, macaroni salad, toasted bran muffins, caramel custard, milk, tea. Dinner—Braised beef of lamb, baked potatoes, buttered spinach, carrot salad, whole wheat bread, currant jelly, Indian pudding, milk, coffee.

Children under school age should be served plain lettuce for their luncheon salad, but as the macaroni salad is somewhat unusual and very good it's worth serving occasionally. It makes a hearty salad for adults and is not too expensive.

Macaroni Salad One and one-half cups cooked macaroni, 1/2 cup cooked peas, 1/2 cup diced celery, 2 canned pineapples, 1 tablespoon minced onion, mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing.

It will take about 3/4 cup of macaroni broken in half-inch lengths to make 1 1/2 cups cooked macaroni. Drain until tender in salted water. Drain and rinse in cold water. This keeps the macaroni white and firm. Drain well and chill thoroughly. Combine macaroni, peas, celery well crisped and drained, onion and pimiento cut in tiny pieces. Mix with a fork, taking care not to crush or break the peas or macaroni. Add mayonnaise to make moist and serve on a bed of lettuce. Garnish with ripe olives.

An oil dressing is preferred to a cooked dressing as the salad is not rich in fat. (Copyright, 1925, NEA Service.)
