FEW KNOW OF CONGRESSMEN

WASHINGTON (NEA Special)—How many Americans can tell who represents them in congress? Very few, answers A. D. Fairbairn, and he tells a story which sounds as if he knows what he's talking about.

Fairbairn is a Washingtonian who recently had occasion to take a trip through 15 of the 48 states, and in the course of this journey accident started him on an investigation into the extent of the average man's familiarity with political personalities.

"Amazing ignorance" is what he found, "in all walks of life," he reports.

The accident which started him? Well, while he was in Omaha it chanced that he needed to learn the name of the congressman from the second Nebraska district. "Telling it for granted that almost any boat voter could tell him, he asked one. To his surprise, the voter didn't know. He asked another. Neither did the second one know.

Curious by this time, Fairbairn kept on asking until he reached the 26th, a hotel clerk, "who," he says, "scratched his head, gave the matter about three minutes' thought and then found, to his keen delight, that he actually could name Judge W. G. Sears"—and Sears, by the way, is a congressman of more than average distinction.

Not to know who he is, in Omaha, is something like not knowing who Calvin Coolidge is in Washington.

At that, the hotel clerk was acquainted with Sears' politics.

His Omaha experience made such an impression on Fairbairn that he continued his questioning throughout the rest of his trip. It led to his discovery of the fact that "the Omaha incident was not unusual but typical."

It was the same way about senators. As for cabinet members, Fairbairn says he found hardly anybody who could name all of them correctly.

Baccarat Favored Game on Emerald Coast; Boule Next
BENARD, (AP)—Baccarat was the favorite game this season on the Emerald Coast of France, with la boule surpassed baccarat at some of the smaller casinos.

Gambling at all the resorts—Dinard, Saint-Malo, Paramé and Saint-Lunaire—netted a profit of \$2,215,687 francs. Of this the state receives 1,251,168 francs. The cities in which the casinos are located also receive part of the earnings.

Gambling was slightly heavier this year on the Emerald Coast than it was last year when the earnings of the casinos were 4,400,288 francs.

BAKER SEEN AS A POTATO CENTER

BAKER, Ore.—"Baker county has a chance to build her potato industry up to the point where it will rank with dairying and timber among the wealth producing resources of the country," declared Fred Entermille in a talk before the Baker chamber of commerce November 15.

Mr. Entermille is one of Baker county's best informed and most successful farmers. He has made a close study of the potato industry here and elsewhere and he was asked to tell the business men what the industry is doing here and what it can be made to do.

The country is fortunate this year, he said. About 25 cars will be shipped out, some of them for seed. Baker raised a good crop in a time of shortage and a good price is being received. The national crop was 452,000,000 bushels last year. This year it is estimated at 346,000,000 bushels, so a big shortage is imminent. Baker county will sell about 115,000 worth of potatoes outside the county, he said.

Oregon has four big producing sections, Malheur county, Weston mountain in Umatilla county, Deschutes county and the Willamette valley. The seed has to be grown on higher altitudes. This gives Baker a fine opportunity to develop a seed producing industry, the speaker said. Profits from seed growing are much larger than from commercial stock. Seed in quantity was sold here this year for the first time.

The marketing problem is not a hard one, Mr. Entermille said. Buyers come for the stock and if the quality is right there is a ready sale. Disease presents a trying problem which the grower must ever be on guard against, he continued. Good seed is always essential.

Paul Carpenter stated that Mr. Entermille shipped two cars of potatoes himself this year. "Baker county is attracting attention as a potato section this year because she has the potatoes," he said, "and they are of good quality."

E. R. Gurney declared the chamber should do something to help the farmers carry out the work Mr. Entermille suggested.
