Opening Day of Oklahoma Strip Enacted at Kimberly

KIMBERLEY, (AP)—Scenes similar to those enacted in Oklahoma when the "strip" was thrown open for settlement, have been witnessed repeatedly in different parts of the South African diamond districts within the last few months on grounds which heretofore had been considered barren.

There are thousands of persons who have become nomads, wandering about the country and engaging in every rush possible to stake out claims at the opening of diamond diggings such as took place some weeks ago at Oerenskraal near Bloemfontein. The race, as in Oklahoma, is made on foot, by men and women on horseback while others follow up in the rear.

"The area of the staked" only is proclaimed by the government, usually after some lucky prospector makes a discovery of traces of the precious stones. Then the race of the diggers begins. Claims are staked and a new town appears. The disappointment of the diamond diggers has been great. At most but two percent of the men make a stake, and in most cases a fortune slips through the miners' fingers through drink, gambling and a sordid living. Only 25 percent make a decent living, 10 percent, some kind of a living, and quite 63 percent sink into increasing distress, said an investigating committee.

Plan Protection of Middle Age Against Modern Pace

NEW YORK (AP)—Guarding the middle-aged against "twenty-first century" strain is becoming one of the principal tasks of American life insurance companies.

During the last 25 years, most of the advance in the direction of longevity has been among children and adults of the younger age, through prevention of infantile deaths and warfare against contagious diseases, in the opinion of insurance men.

Now attention is being turned to men and women around 50 years of age and this subject will be the chief topic of discussion at the convention of the Association of Life Insurance Presidents here, December 3-4.

All data in possession of the companies will be studied in the hope that records of the living may best point the way to solution of the problem.

Why, for example, is the percentage of deaths from diseases of the heart, arteries and kidneys in the age group 45 to 64 more than three times as great as the percentage of the group 20 to 29? What tendency, respectively, do accountants, laborers, bookkeepers, lawyers, physicians, farmers, merchants, manufacturers and others show of these diseases?

These and other questions will be propounded and an effort made to obtain agreement among the experts on a practical program for the betterment of conditions affecting the middle aged.

Vilma Banky Here Soon in Film Debt

Few artists from abroad assimilate American customs and usages as rapidly as has Vilma Banky, the exotic Hungarian beauty recently discovered in Budapest by Samuel Goldwyn. And now, according to observers, Vilma has as quickly accomplished the fitness technique of the American actress.

In Europe, where Miss Banky served her apprenticeship at motion picture work, apparently pictures carry only a certain provincial appeal, catering to the tastes and entertainment of only certain classes of certain nationalities.

It was along these lines that Vilma was coached and trained prior to her fateful meeting with Goldwyn, who recognized her latent genius and bestowed upon her a long-term contract before he had ever seen her upon the screen.

Since her arrival in Hollywood, but a few months ago, she has completed but one motion picture—George Fitzmaurice's production of "The Dark Angel," which is booked as a First National offering at the Arcade Theatre next Monday. Yet, with her high degree of intelligence, according to Fitzmaurice, she easily cut off the technique acquired abroad, devoting herself studiously to the Americanization of her work, with astonishing success.

"She combines," says Fitzmaurice, "that indefinable something which apparently is the birthright of the European actress—that intuitive grace and gift of self-expression which stamp indelibly the born artist—with the less subtle, but more effective method of expression which marks the interpretations of the American players. The combination is irresistible."

"The Dark Angel," which gives American audiences their first glimpse of Miss Banky, is an adaptation from the stage play of the same title.
