## BAKER TURNS TO HOOP GAME

BAKER, Ore. (Special) — With the football season of the Baker high school at an end after one of the most victorious years in the history of the school, Coach Elmer is now turning his efforts toward the production of a basketball team of championship caliber.

First practice will begin this evening with the resuming of school after the Thanksgiving holidays. Several of last year's lettermen will be on hand to don their garments for another season, and the prospects for a winning combination are exceptionally bright at the present time. George Huff, Carson Cannon, Jesse Payne, Claude Hines and Tom Huff, all members of last year's squad will be out along with a large turnover of prospective material from the various classes.

The five men mentioned were developed into a winning team last season, and it is thought that Baker's chance for the district championship will be even brighter this year. They were runners-up in the Eastern Oregon tournament last year, and might have become champions had it not been for a misunderstanding during the playing of the games. They lost by default to the team that represented Eastern Oregon at Salem for state honors.

This year, however, the team is determined to make the trip to the state capital and bring home the honor. If this should happen, it will be the first time since 1923 when the city took the state championship, but lost again by default.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The brief but meteoric dash of football across the western continent in 1925 left a wake of startling upsets followed by the crowning of a new Pacific coast conference champion for the first time in six years.

The seasonal clashes saw the University of California ousted from the throne. To the University of Washington went the honor of terminating the reign of the Golden Bear.

By a coincidence, Washington beat the last team to defeat California before it started on its long rule of coast football. In 1918 the Huskies won 7 to 6 and on November 14, 1925, the northwesterers defeated with a 7 to 6 score.

In winning 10 of its 11 games this season Washington rolled up a total of 443 points to a total of 23 for its opponents. One game ended in a 6 to 6 tie. It was the contest with the University of Nebraska.

Washington came through the coast conference races with five victories. To win the title they defeated Montana 30-10; Washington State college 23-0; Stanford, 12-0; California 7-0, and Oregon 11-14.

California suffered its first defeat when the San Francisco Oceanic club came out on the hour end of a 13-0 score.

Stanford Second.

Stanford ended the season with four conference wins and one defeat and placed next to Washington in the race. In nine games the Cardinals gathered a total of 221 points as against 71 scored against them. The climax was reached when they overcame California in the "big game." It was the first time in 28 years that Stanford had defeated their traditional rivals at American football.

Oregon this year finished last in the conference. Five times the "Webfoolers" bowed to other teams. They rose to their greatest strength against Washington on Thanksgiving day. That game Oregon scored two touchdowns and converted the team for point.

While possessing out of the outstanding stars of the contest William Kelly, quarterback, Montana was unable to fare well in its gridiron tussle this season. It finished next to last in the coast conference with one victory and four defeats. Kelly's brilliant work enabled the Grizzlies to down Idaho, 20 to 14.

Cougars To Idaho.

The Cougars of Washington State college opened slowly, but sprang out to break the tough tape in a tie with Idaho. In their last game of the season, the Cougars landed Los Angeles Saturday and won a 17 to 11 victory over Southern California.

This conference season is not yet over for the University of Southern California as the Trojans play Oregon Agricultural college on December 5. Their defeat Saturday by W. S. C. gave the Southern California eleven a standing of two wins and a like number of losses.

Oregon Aggies turned out a strong eleven which gained its greatest triumph with a decisive defeat of Oregon, 24 to 12. The Aggies, with two victories and one loss, can go into a tie with Stanford for second place by knocking southern California next Saturday.

Givayer Clothing May Result from Discovery MANCHESTER, England (AP)—A wool substitute, said to be just as warm and comfortable as the real thing, is expected by its inventor to result in cheaper clothing.

The cloth is called Washwool and the manufacturer explained it consists of 50 percent pure wool fiber and 50 percent ordinary recovered wool.

# 'WHITE CARGO' WELL PLAYED

"White Cargo" came to La Grande Saturday night, was witnessed by several hundred at the Arcade theatre and is now but a memory—but many who saw the production are still unable to correctly analyze their feelings as to the impression that is left.

Some liked it, some did not like it, and the majority are still wondering.

Apparently the acting was superb, realistic of a type not often witnessed here.

The plot, simple in every detail, dealt with white man's attempt to civilize rot-ridden Africa—and inevitable failure; and mammy palaver; and stark, stirring, unceasing monotony. Nothing extraordinary, but a tear from a page of the geography.

The story has to do with primal conditions; it lacks the niceties of civilization; it is shocking, essentially so. Yet it doesn't leave a bad taste in one's mouth. Rather, a feeling of sympathy with those who hopelessly fight, until resistance is broken, against the stagnation, the demoralization, and the rot.

The outstanding feature of "White Cargo" is the superb portrayal of the role of Witel, seven-year-old boy of a rubber company in the tropics, by Earl B. Dwyer. In a company of good actors, his ability impressed one more and more as the play progressed.

Something different, something appealing in an entirely new way, something grotesque and at the same time natural—paradoxical through its strangeness, seems "White Cargo" leaves one thinking, holds one's interest until the end, and provides entertainment; therefore it is in demand and will still be in demand when other successes have fallen into oblivion.

Miss Isabelle Herbert, as Tondoy, the only woman in the cast, furnished the "feminine" interest. Scarcely clad, she represented a primitive vamp—half black, half white—who knew the white man was her prey and conducted herself accordingly.

Other members of the cast: The actor, Marshall Vincent; Ashley, Lawrence Keating; The Missionary, Milton Bosler; The Skipper, Willard Husbolt; The Engineer, James Ryan; Langford, Franklin George; Worthing, Fred Hunt; Jim Pugh, John Henry.

The play is cast in the rubber company's branch station and no change of scenes take place during the entire show.

"Blossom Time" a musical play, will be the next attraction to be shown at the Arcade, and is scheduled to be here in December.

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## Red Grange Helps Bears Earn Victory

CHICAGO (AP)—Harold "Red" Grange, making his second appearance as a professional football player Sunday, "did his stuff" on a snow covered aridron, helping the Chicago Bears defeat the Columbus Tigers, 14 to 13, while 29,000 fans shouted their approval.

Aside from exercising his first professional football victory Grange was also able to win almost twice as much yardage as he did in his first professional game, Thanksgiving day.

He carried the ball 16 times for a gain of 123 yards, and from scrimmage advanced the ball 73 yards. The famous red-head played the entire first half and was out the third period, but the crowd was so insistent on seeing him that the Wharton ice man was rushed back for the last period.

He shot four forward passes, two being completed and paving the way for his team's two touchdowns. One of them, Grange to Walquist was good for 35 yards and his team's first touchdown. He scored 10 points himself.

He was on the receiving end of two forward passes and on one of them he reeled 49 yards but fumbled. Twice he received punts, one going back 39 yards before being downed.
